Independent Auditor's Report

To the Board of Directors Rural Franklinton Water Corporation Franklinton, Louisiana

Report of the Audit of the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Rural Franklinton Water Corporation (the Corporation), which comprise the statements of financial position as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the related statements of revenues, expenses, and changes in fund equity, functional expenses, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Corporation as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS) and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Corporation and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with U.S. GAAP; and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Corporation's ability to continue as a going concern for twelve months beyond the financial statement date, including any currently known information that may raise substantial doubt shortly thereafter.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS and Government Auditing Standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether
 due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks.

 disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit
 procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing
 an opinion on the effectiveness of the Corporation's internal control. Accordingly, no such
 opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Corporation's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Other Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Corporation's basic financial statements. The schedule of compensation, benefits, and other payments to agency head is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. In our opinion, the schedule of compensation, benefits, and other payments to agency head is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated May 27, 2025, on our consideration of the Corporation's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, and other matters. Notes to Financial Statements

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations

Rural Franklinton Water Corporation (the Corporation) was formed on March 26, 1974, as a non-profit corporation under the provisions of Title 12, Sections 201-269 of the Louisiana Revised Statutes. The purpose of the Corporation is to construct, maintain, and operate a private water system for the mutual benefit of its members.

The Corporation's significant accounting policies consistently applied in the preparation of the accompanying financial statements follow.

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements are accounted for using the accrual basis of accounting, whereby revenues are recognized when they are earned and expenses are recognized when incurred. Interest paid on loan proceeds used in financing construction of certain assets is capitalized during the construction period.

The Corporation reports information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of fund equity:

Fund Equity Without Donor Restrictions - Fund equity for general use that is not subject to donor-imposed restrictions.

Fund Equity With Donor Restrictions - Fund equity whose use is limited by donor- or grantor-imposed time and/or purpose restrictions. Once funds are expended for their restricted purpose, this restricted fund equity is released to fund equity without donor restrictions. The Corporation had no donor-restricted fund equity for 2024 or 2023.

Accounts Receivable

The Corporation's accounts receivable are amounts due from water customers and are carried at original billed amount, net of an allowance for doubtful accounts. Credit is extended to customers and collateral is not required, but deposits are collected when service is originally connected. Accounts are due monthly and are considered delinquent if not paid by the 15th of the month subsequent to the month billed. Service is disconnected if payment is not received by the 1st of the second month subsequent to the original month billed. For 2022, management determined the allowance for doubtful accounts based upon prior experience and age of accounts receivable. At December 21, 2022, the total allowance for doubtful accounts was \$69,939.

Notes to Financial Statements

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Accounts Receivable (Continued)

After adoption of Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 326-20 *Financial Instruments - Credit Losses* on January 1, 2023, management determines the allowance using an estimate of expected credit losses, applied to customer groupings with similar risk characteristics, based on historical experience, current economic conditions and certain forward-looking information. Account balances are written-off against the established allowance when management determines it is probable the receivable will not be collected. During 2023, management wrote-off several stale balances against the allowance for credit losses, significantly reducing gross receivables and the allowance balance. As of December 31, 2024 and December 31, 2023, the total allowance recorded for credit losses was \$8,864 and \$3,865 respectively.

Property, Plant, and Equipment

Property, plant, and equipment are carried at cost. Improvements are capitalized and maintenance and repairs are charged to operations. Depreciation is provided for in amounts sufficient to relate the cost of depreciable assets to operations over their estimated service lives on a straight-line basis. It is the Corporation's policy to capitalize fixed assets over \$500.

Income Taxes

The Corporation is exempt from federal and state income taxes under Section 501(c)(12) of the Internal Revenue Code. Accordingly, no income tax provision has been recorded. The Corporation is, however, required to file federal Form 990 - Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax. This is an informational return only. The Corporation believes that it has appropriate support for any tax positions taken and, as such, does not have any uncertain tax positions that require adjustment to the financial statements.

Penalties and interest assessed by income taxing authorities, if any, would be included in income tax expense.

Statements of Cash Flows

The Corporation considers all highly liquid short-term investments with an original maturity of three months or less when purchased to be cash equivalents.

Functional Allocation of Expenses

The costs of program and supporting services activities have been summarized on a functional basis on the statements of revenues, expenses, and changes in fund equity. The statements of functional expenses present the natural classification detail of expenses by function. Accordingly, expenses are allocated between those attributable to program services (water distribution) and those attributable to supporting services (general and administrative). Salaries and related payroll expenses are allocated based upon the time spent for each function.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP) requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Water Sales Revenue

The Corporation's primary revenue source consists of fees collected from customers in exchange for water utility service. All customers must complete an application for connection to water service. Customers are billed monthly based on the prior month's usage. The Corporation also collects reconnection fees in the event of service transfers and new meter installation. Revenue from water sales and related services are recognized once the performance obligation is satisfied, typically when the customer is billed for that month's water usage and any related service fees. Rates charged for water usage are disclosed in Note 9.

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Accounting Pronouncements Adopted in the Current Year

On January 1, 2023, the Corporation adopted Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2016-13 and all subsequent ASUs that modified ASU 2016-13, which have been codified under ASC 326, *Financial Instruments - Credit Losses*. The Corporation adopted this guidance using the modified retrospective approach, as required, and has not adjusted prior period comparative information and will continue to disclose prior period financial information in accordance with previous accounting guidance. Adoption of ASC 326 to the estimate of the allowance for credit losses was insignificant.

Note 2. Cash and Restricted Cash

The Corporation periodically maintains cash in bank accounts in excess of insured limits. Cash held in bank accounts in excess of insured limits was \$184,926 at December 31, 2024. The Corporation has not experienced any losses and does not believe that significant credit risk exists as a result of this practice.

Revenue Note Account

The mortgage payable to USDA requires that \$2,682 be deposited into this account monthly until the amount needed to pay the annual note payment has been attained. At December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Revenue Note Account balance was \$59,534 and \$59,528, respectively. The required deposit amount has been attained.

Depreciation and Contingency Account

Monthly deposits of \$2,156 have been made as a reserve for the purpose of paying the cost of major repairs or damage caused by an unforeseen catastrophe and for replacements made necessary by the depreciation of the facility. At December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Depreciation and Contingency Account balance was \$103,418 and \$95,799, respectively. The required deposit amount has been attained.

Reserve Account

The mortgage payable to USDA requires that \$501 be deposited into this account monthly until \$62,532 is accumulated. This reserve is to act an as emergency fund for maintenance and repairs and debt repayment should the need arise. Whenever disbursements are made from the Reserve Account, monthly deposits must be resumed. At December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Reserve Account balance was \$70,994 and \$58,988, respectively. Required monthly deposits were made during 2023.

Note 11. Compensated Absences

According to the Corporation's policy regarding paid vacation, each full-time employee receives 5 days paid vacation annually which can be accumulated up to 25 days. As of December 31, 2024, the amount of accrued vacation was immaterial and is not reflected in these financial statements. Employees also receive one-half day sick leave per month, which may be accumulated up to a maximum of 45 days. Since accumulated sick leave is not paid on termination, it also is not reflected in these financial statements.

Note 12. Pension Plan

The Corporation maintains a defined contribution pension plan as defined under Section 401(k) of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code covering substantially all employees. The Corporation matches employee contributions up to 5% of their annual salary. Employees may elect to contribute 5%, 3%, or 2% of their earnings. Employer contributions during the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022 were approximately \$5,000 and \$6,000, respectively.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

Significant journal entries were required to correct payroll liabilities, property, plant,

and equipment and prepaid expenses.

Cause: Unknown.

Effect: Material weakness in internal control.

Recommendation: We recommend that the Corporation implement controls to prevent or

timely identify errors in financial reporting.
