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Independent Accountants' Review Report

To the Board of Commissioners Webster Parish Fire Protection District No. 11 Springhill, Louisiana

We have reviewed the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and major fund of the Webster Parish Fire Protection District No. 11, a component unit of the Webster Parish Police Jury, as of and for the year ended December 31, 2019, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. A review includes primarily applying analytical procedures to management's financial data and making inquiries of management of the Webster Parish Fire Protection District No. 11. A review is substantially less in scope than an audit, the objective of which is the expression of an opinion regarding the financial statements as a whole. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion.

### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements that are free from material misstatement whether due to fraud or error.

### Accountants' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to conduct the review engagement in accordance with Statements on Standards for Accounting and Review Services promulgated by the Accounting and Review Services Committee of the AICPA. Those standards require us to perform procedures to obtain limited assurance as a basis for reporting whether we are aware of any material modifications that should be made to the financial statements for them to be in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. We believe that the results of our procedures provide a reasonable basis for our conclusion.

We are required to be independent of Webster Parish Fire Protection District No. 11 and to meet our ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements related to our review.

### Accountants' Conclusion

Based on our review, we are not aware of any material modifications that should be made to the accompanying financial statements in order for them to be in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

### Other Matter

Management has omitted the budgetary comparison schedule and the management's discussion and analysis that accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require to be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such missing information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of the financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. The results of our review of the basic financial statements are not affected by this missing information.

### Supplementary Information

The supplementary information included in the accompanying Schedule of Compensation, Benefits, and Other Payments to Agency Head on page 19 is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. This supplementary information is the responsibility of management and was derived from, and relates directly to, the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The supplementary information has been subjected to the review procedures applied in our review of the basic financial statements. We are not aware of any material modifications that should be made to the supplementary information. We have not audited the supplementary information and do not express an opinion on it.

### INTRODUCTION

The Webster Parish Fire Protection District No. 11 (District) was created by the Webster Parish Police Jury (Police Jury) by resolution, dated April 2, 1991, in accordance with Louisiana Revised Statutes 40:1491, et seq. The District is governed by a five-member Board of Commissioners (Board). Two members are appointed by the Police Jury; two members are appointed by the Mayor of the City of Springhill, Louisiana; and one member is appointed by the other four members of the Board. The District is responsible for maintaining and operating fire stations and equipment, and providing fire protection and emergency services to residents within the District's boundaries.

### (1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The Webster Parish Fire Protection District No. 11's financial statements are prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is responsible for establishing GAAP for state and local governments through its pronouncements (Statements and Interpretations). The more significant accounting policies established in GAAP and used by the Webster Parish Fire Protection District No. 11 are discussed below.

### A. Reporting Entity

Because the Webster Parish Police Jury appoints two members of the governing board, the District operates within the geographical boundaries of Webster Parish, and due to the nature and significance of the relationship with the Webster Parish Police Jury, the District was determined to be a component unit of the Webster Parish Police Jury, the governing body of the parish and the governmental body with oversight responsibility. This report includes only funds which are maintained by the District and does not present information on the Webster Parish Police Jury, the general government service provided by that governmental unit, or the other governmental units that comprise the Webster Parish Police Jury.

### B. Basic Financial Statements – Government-Wide Statements

The Webster Parish Fire Protection District No. 11's basic financial statements include both government-wide (reporting the funds maintained by the Webster Parish Fire Protection District No. 11 as a whole) and fund financial statements (reporting the Webster Parish Fire Protection District No. 11's major funds). Both the government-wide and fund financial statements categorize primary activities as either governmental or business type. The Webster Parish Fire Protection District No. 11's general fund is classified as governmental activities. The Webster Parish Fire Protection District No. 11 does not have any business-type activities.

In the government-wide Statement of Net Position, the governmental activities column is presented on a consolidated basis and is reported on a full accrual, economic resource basis, which recognizes all long-term assets and receivables as well as long-term debt and obligations. The Webster Parish Fire Protection District No. 11's net position is reported in two parts — net investment in capital assets and unrestricted net position.

The government-wide Statement of Activities reports both the gross and net cost of each of the Webster Parish Fire Protection District No. 11's functions. The functions are supported by program revenues and general government revenues. The Statement of Activities reduces gross expenses (including depreciation) by any related program revenues, which must be directly associated with the function. Program revenues of the District consist of fees charged to customers by the City of Springhill and remitted to the District. The net costs (by function) are normally covered by general revenues.

This government-wide focus is more on the sustainability of the Webster Parish Fire Protection District No. 11 as an entity and the change in the Webster Parish Fire Protection District No. 11's net position resulting from the current year's activities.

### C. Basic Financial Statements – Fund Financial Statements

The financial transactions of the Webster Parish Fire Protection District No. 11 are recorded in individual funds in the fund financial statements. Each fund is accounted for by providing a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprises its assets, liabilities, reserves, fund equity, revenues and expenditures. The various funds are reported by generic classification within the financial statements.

The following fund types are used by the Webster Parish Fire Protection District No. 11:

Governmental Funds – the focus of the governmental funds' measurement (in the fund statements) is upon determination of financial position and changes in financial position (sources, uses, and balances of financial resources) rather than upon net income. The following is a description of the governmental funds of the Webster Parish Fire Protection District No. 11:

a. General fund is the general operating fund of the Webster Parish Fire Protection District No. 11. It is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

The emphasis in fund financial statements is on the major funds in the governmental category. GASB sets forth minimum criteria (percentage of the assets, liabilities, revenues, or expenditures/expenses of either fund category or the governmental and enterprise combined) for the determination of major funds. The District's general fund was determined to be a major fund.

### D. Basis of Accounting

Basis of accounting refers to the point at which revenues or expenditures are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. It relates to the timing of the measurements made regardless of the measurement focus applied.

### 1. Accrual:

The governmental funds in the government-wide financial statements are presented on the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when incurred.

Revenues of the Webster Parish Fire Protection District No. 11 consist principally of property taxes, intergovernmental revenues - fire insurance rebate, fire protection and rescue fees and interest income. Property taxes are recorded in the year for which the taxes are levied. Property taxes are assessed on a calendar year basis, become due on November 15 of each year, and become delinquent on December 31. Because the 2019 tax levy is intended to fund the 2020 fiscal year, the levy has been recorded as a receivable and deferred inflows of resources. Interest income is recorded when earned. Intergovernmental revenues are recorded when received because they are generally not measurable until actually received.

### Modified Accrual:

The governmental funds financial statements are presented on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under modified accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recorded when susceptible to accrual: i.e., both measurable and available. "Available" means collectible within the current period or within 60 days after year end. Expenditures are generally recognized under the modified accrual basis of accounting when the related liability is incurred. The exception to this rule is that principal and interest on general obligation long-term debt, if any, is recognized when due. Depreciation is not recognized in the governmental fund financial statements

### E. Budgets

The District's new administration assumed operations of the District in March 2019. The new administration was unable to locate evidence of adoption of a budget for the year ending December 31, 2019.

### F. Cash, Cash Equivalents, and Investments

Cash includes amounts in petty cash, interest-bearing demand deposits, and money market accounts. Cash equivalents include amounts in time deposits and those investments with original maturities of 90 days or less. Under state law, the district may deposit funds in demand deposits, interest-bearing demand deposits, or money market accounts with state banks organized under Louisiana law or any other state of the United States, or under the laws of the United States.

### G. Capital Assets

Capital assets purchased or acquired with an original cost of \$2,500 or more are reported at historical cost or estimated historical cost. Contributed assets are reported at acquisition value as of the date received. Additions, improvements, and other capital outlays that significantly extend the useful life of an asset are capitalized. Other costs incurred for repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred.

Depreciation on all assets is provided on the straight-line basis over the following estimated useful lives:

Buildings and Improvements 7 – 40 years Equipment 5 – 10 years Vehicles 5 – 15 years

### H. Deferred Outflows/Inflows of Resources

In addition to assets, the statement of financial position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred outflows of resources. This separate financial statement element deferred outflows of resources, represents a consumption of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (expense/expenditure) until then. At this time, the District has no transactions that meet the definition of deferred outflows of resources.

The District's governmental activities and governmental fund report a separate section for deferred inflows of resources. This separate financial statement element represents an acquisition of net position that applies to a future period and so will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that time. The District has one item that met this definition and qualifies for reporting in this category. Accordingly, the item "unavailable revenue" is reported in the governmental fund balance sheet and statement of net position. The District reports unavailable revenue from one source: ad valorem taxes. This amount is deferred and recognized as an inflow of resources in the period for which the amounts were levied and budgeted.

### Use of Estimates

Management uses estimates and assumptions in preparing financial statements. Those estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities, and reported revenues and expenses. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

### J. Net Position

Net position represents the difference between assets and liabilities. Net position invested in capital assets, net of related debt consist of capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation, reduced by the outstanding balance of any borrowing used for the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets. Net position is reported as restricted when there are limitations imposed on its use either through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation adopted by the district or through external restrictions imposed by creditors, grantors, or laws or regulations of other governments. The District's policy is to first apply restricted resources when an expense is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted net position is available.

### K. Fund Balances

GASB has issued Statement No. 54, Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions, which defines the different types of fund balances that a governmental entity must use for financial reporting purposes. GASB 54 requires the fund balance amounts to be properly reported within one of the fund balance categories list below.

- Nonspendable fund balances are amounts that cannot be spent because they are either

   (a) not in spendable form, such as inventory or prepaid expenses, or (b) legally or
   contractually required to be maintained intact, such as a trust that must be retained in
   perpetuity.
- Restricted fund balances are restricted when constraints placed on the use of resources are either (a) externally imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments, or (b) imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.
- 3. Committed fund balances include amounts that can be used only for the specific purposes as a result of constraints imposed by the District's board of commissioners (the District's highest level of decision making authority). Committed amounts cannot be used for any other purpose unless the District's board of commissioners removes those constraints by taking the same type of action (i.e. legislation, resolution, or ordinance).
- 4. Assigned fund balances are amounts that are constrained by the District's intent to be used for specific purposes, but are neither restricted nor committed. The District's board of commissioners have the authority to assign amounts to be used for specific purposes.
- Unassigned fund balance are the residual classification for the District's general fund and include all spendable amounts not contained in the other classifications.

When both restricted and unrestricted fund balances are available for use, it is the District's policy to use restricted fund balance first, then unrestricted fund balance. Furthermore, committed fund balances are reduced first, followed by assigned amounts, and then unassigned amounts when expenditures are incurred for purposes for which amounts in any of those unrestricted fund balance classifications can be used.

### (2) Levied Taxes

The following is a summary of authorized and levied ad valorem taxes:

The millage was renewed in 2022 at 10.00 mills for the years 2022-2031.

### (3) Cash, Cash Equivalents, and Investments

At December 31, 2019, the District had cash and cash equivalents (book balances), totaling \$12,661, as detailed below.

### Cash and Cash Equivalents

The District had cash and cash equivalents at December 31, 2019 (book balances) totaling \$12,661, in interest bearing demand deposits and demand deposit accounts. These deposits are stated at cost, which approximates market. Under state law, these deposits (or the resulting bank balances) must be secured by federal deposit insurance or the pledge of securities owned by the fiscal agent bank. The market value of the pledged securities plus the federal deposit insurance must at all times equal the amount on deposit with the fiscal agent.

### Credit Risk

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank or other depositing institution failure, the government's deposits may not be returned to it. As of December 31, 2019, all of the District's bank balances totaling \$15,578, were secured by federal deposit insurance.

### (4) Risk Management

The District purchases commercial insurance to provide workers compensation coverage and general liability and property insurance.

### (5) Prior Period Restatement

Fund balance and net position at December 31, 2018, was restated to correct the recognition of certain grant revenue and expenditures and to record a promissory note for disallowed FEMA grant funds, as follows:

### (6) Disallowed Costs - FEMA Grant

On July 6, 2020, the District received notice from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) that certain costs charged to a 2011 disaster grant were determined to be disallowed. FEMA requested repayment of \$185,953 in disallowed costs. The District signed a promissory note with FEMA and began making monthly payments of \$1,640 on March 1, 2022. Payments will continue through February 1, 2032, in accordance with the terms of the agreement.

### Capital Leases

The District has entered into four capital lease obligations for a pumper truck, rescue truck, ladder truck, station bay, training tower and burn room, and a rescue pumper. The station bay lease is collateralized by a 1999/2000 pumper truck which is owned by the District. The lease agreements have interest rates ranging from 3.50% to 4.084%. The debt will be paid from funds legally available for such purposes by the District. The assets acquired through these capital leases as reported in the governmental activities on the statement of net position, are reported at \$896,997, less accumulated depreciation of \$348,288, for a net book value of \$548,709 at December 31, 2019. Depreciation expense on the leased assets for 2019 totaled \$56,123.

Subsequent to December 31, 2019, the District obtained a loan to pay off the remaining Rescue Truck, Ladder Truck & Bay Station balance. The lease was paid in full in February 2022, using the loan proceeds.

### Promissory Note - FEMA

On July 6, 2020, the District received notice from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) that certain costs charged to a 2011 disaster grant were determined to be disallowed. FEMA requested repayment of \$185,953 in disallowed costs. The District signed a promissory note with FEMA and began making monthly payments of \$1,640 on March 1, 2022. Payments will continue through February 1, 2032, in accordance with the terms of the agreement.

### (10) Subsequent Events

In February 2022, the District entered into a loan agreement to pay off the remaining balance of a lease obligation related to a Rescue Truck, Ladder Truck, and Bay Station. The loan was executed on February 23, 2022 with a local bank, in the amount of \$170,000, with an interest rate of 4.8% and a term of 120 months.

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Independent Accountants' Report On Applying Agreed–Upon Procedures
