## INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Honorable Mayor and Members  
of the Board of Aldermen  
Town of Gramercy, Louisiana

### Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

#### *Opinions*

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, and each major fund of the Town of Gramercy, Louisiana, (the "Town"), as of and for the year ended June 30, 2025, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, and each major fund of the Town, as of June 30, 2025, and the respective changes in financial position, and, where applicable, cash flows thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

#### *Basis for Opinions*

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Town, and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

#### *Emphasis of Matter - Change in Accounting Principle*

As discussed in Note 1 to the financial statements, the Town adopted Government Accounting Standards Board ("GASB") Statement 101, *Compensated Absences*. This new standard enhances the recognition and measurement model for compensated absences which includes an assessment of earned leave that is more likely than not to be paid or used in the future as of the balance sheet date. Our opinion is not modified with respect to this matter.

## ***Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements***

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Town's ability to continue as a going concern for twelve months beyond the financial statement date, including any currently known information that may raise substantial doubt shortly thereafter.

## ***Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements***

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinions. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and *Government Auditing Standards*, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Town's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Town's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.



### ***Required Supplementary Information***

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis on pages 5 through 11, schedule of changes in total other post-employment liability and related ratios on page 50, schedule of the Town's proportionate share of the net pension liability on page 51, schedule of the Town's contributions on page 52, notes to the required supplementary information on page 53, and the budgetary comparison schedules on pages 54 through 59 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

### ***Other Supplementary Information***

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements. The schedule of principal officials and salaries, the schedule of compensation, benefits, and other payments to agency head, and the justice system funding schedule – collecting/disbursing entity as required by Act 87 of 2020 Regular Legislative Session – cash basis presentation, are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the schedule of principal officials and salaries, the schedule of compensation, benefits and other payments to agency head, and the justice system funding schedule – collecting/disbursing entity as required by Act 87 of 2020 Regular Legislative Session – cash basis presentation are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

### ***Other Information***

Management is responsible for the other information included in the annual report. The other information comprises the insurance-in-force schedule (unaudited) and public utility system operations schedule (unaudited) but does not include the basic financial statements and our auditors' report thereon. Our opinions on the basic financial statements do not cover the other information, and we do not express an opinion or any form of assurance thereon.

In connection with our audit of the basic financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and consider whether a material inconsistency exists between the other information and the basic financial statements, or the other information otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work performed, we conclude that an uncorrected material misstatement of the other information exists, we are required to describe it in our report.



### **Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards**

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated December 17, 2025, on our consideration of the Town's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Town's internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the Town's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

This section of the Town of Gramercy's (the "Town") annual financial report presents our discussion and analysis of the Town's financial performance during the fiscal year that ended on June 30, 2025. Please read it in conjunction with the Town's financial statements, which follows this section.

**FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS**

- Total assets and deferred outflows of resources of the Town exceeded its total liabilities and deferred inflows of resources at the close of the most recent fiscal year by \$9,269,930 (net position). Of this amount, \$1,911,154 (unrestricted net position) may be used to meet the Town's ongoing obligations to citizens and creditors.
- During the year, the Town's governmental activities expenses were approximately \$1.2 million less than the approximately \$4.0 million generated in charges for services, grants, taxes, and other revenue. In the Town's business-type activities, expenses and transfers were approximately \$16,200 more than the approximately \$1.8 million generated in revenues.
- The general fund reported approximately \$4.5 million fund balance at year end.

**OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

This annual report consists of four parts - management's discussion and analysis (this section), the basic financial statements, required supplementary information, and a supplemental section that includes schedules of detailed budgetary amounts and compensation/salary schedules for principal officials and agency head. The basic financial statements include two kinds of statements that present different views of the Town:

- The first two statements are government-wide financial statements that provide both long-term and short-term information about the Town's overall financial status.
- The remaining statements are fund financial statements that focus on individual parts of the Town's government, reporting the Town's operations in more detail than the government-wide statements.
  - The governmental fund statements tell how general government services like public safety were financed in the short term as well as what remains for future spending.
  - Proprietary fund statements offer *short* and *long-term* financial information about the activities that the government operates *like businesses*, such as water and sewer systems.

The financial statements also include notes that explain some of the information in the financial statements and provide more detailed data. The statements are followed by a section of required supplementary information that further explains and supports the information in the financial statements. Figure A-1 shows how the required parts of this annual report are arranged and relate to one another and summarizes the major features of the Town's financial statements, including the portion of the Town's government they cover and the types of information they contain. The remainder of this overview section of management's discussion and analysis explains the structure of contents of each of the statements.

**Government-wide Statements**

The government-wide statements report information about the Town as a whole using accounting methods similar to those used by private-sector companies. The statement of net position includes all of the government's assets and liabilities. All of the current year's revenues and expenses are accounted for in the statement of activities regardless of when cash is received or paid.

The two government-wide statements report the Town's net position and how they have changed. Net position - the difference between the Town's assets and deferred outflows of resources and liabilities and deferred inflows of resources - is one way to measure the Town's financial health, or position.

- Over time, increases or decreases in the Town's net position are an indicator of whether its financial health is improving or deteriorating, respectively.
- To assess the overall health of the Town you need to consider additional non-financial factors such as changes in the Town's property tax base and the condition of the Town's infrastructure.

The government-wide financial statements of the Town are divided into two categories:

- Governmental activities - most of the Town's basic services are included here, such as the police, fire, public works, and general administration. Property taxes, sales taxes, franchise fees, and interest finance most of these activities.
- Business-type activities - The Town charges fees to customers to help it cover the costs of certain services it provides. The Town's water and sewer system are included here.

**Fund Financial Statements**

The fund financial statements provide more detailed information about the Town's most significant funds - not the Town as a whole. Funds are accounting devices that the Town uses to keep track of specific sources of funding and spending for particular purposes. Some funds are required by State law and by bond covenants.

The Town has two kinds of funds:

- Governmental funds - Most of the Town's basic services are included in its governmental funds, which focuses on (1) how cash and other financial assets that can readily be converted to cash flow in and out and (2) the balances left at year-end that are available for spending. Consequently, the governmental fund statements provide a detailed short-term view that helps you determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent in the near future to finance the Town's programs. Because this information does not encompass the additional long-term focus of the government-wide statements, we provide additional information on the subsequent page that explains the relationship (or differences) between them.
- Proprietary funds - Services for which the Town charges customers a fee are generally reported in proprietary funds. Proprietary funds, like the government-wide statements, provide both long-term and short-term financial information. In fact, the Town's enterprise funds (one type of proprietary fund) are the same as its business-type activities, but provide more detail and additional information, such as cash flows.

**FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE TOWN AS A WHOLE**

**Net position.** The Town's combined net position increased between fiscal years 2024 and 2025 to approximately \$9.3 million from approximately \$8.2 million. (See Table A-1)

Net position of the Town's governmental activities increased approximately 29.5 percent to approximately \$5.0 million. Net position of the Town's business-type activities decreased approximately 1.1 percent to \$4.3 million.

**Changes in net position.** The Town's total revenues increased by approximately \$1.1 million to approximately \$5.68 million. Approximately 31.5 percent of the Town's revenue comes from charges for services, 23.6 percent comes from tax collections, and 23.9 percent comes from operating and capital grants.

The Town's total expenses increased by approximately \$1.2 million or 35.4 percent to approximately \$4.5 million. Approximately 63.1 percent of the Town's expenses come from governmental activities and 36.9 percent come from its business-type activities. (See Table A-2)

**Governmental Activities**

Revenues for the Town's governmental activities increased by approximately \$662,000 or 20.5 percent. This increase is attributed to the increase in grant revenues recognized in the current year. Grant revenues relate to Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (CSLFRF) spent in the current year and a State Capital Outlay grant received for drainage work. Total governmental activities expenses increased by approximately \$1.2 million or 75.9 percent. The increase is predominantly a result of changed to the Town's share of its Municipal Police Employees Retirement net pension liability.

**Business-Type Activities**

Revenues for the Town's business-type activities increased by 37.4 percent to approximately \$1.78 million while total expenses decreased 2.8 percent to approximately \$1.7 million. The Town had rate increases in both July 1, 2024 and January 1, 2025 that contributed to the increase in charges for services. Additionally, the Town received State Capital Outlay funding to complete the sewer force main project.

**FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE TOWN'S FUNDS**

As the Town completed the year, its general fund reported fund balance of approximately \$4.5 million, an increase of 25.4 percent from last year. Increase is the result of large increases in grant revenues from CSLFRF and capital outlay funds from the State of Louisiana.

**General Fund Budgetary Highlights**

Federal and State grant revenues were over \$400,000 more than budgeted as a result of more grant funding than anticipated. Total expenditures came in approximately \$370,000 under budget. This is due to the Town over budgeting for salaries and equipment purchases.

**CAPITAL ASSETS AND DEBT ADMINISTRATION**

At the end of the 2025 fiscal year, the Town had invested approximately \$7.8 million in a broad range of capital assets, including police equipment, buildings, vehicles, and water and sewer systems. (See Table A-3) This amount represents a net increase (including additions and deductions) of approximately \$300,000 or 4.0 percent, when compared to last year.

Net increase in capital assets is a result of the current year capital asset additions, largely canal upgrades, exceeding current year disposals and depreciation expense.

**Outstanding debt.** At the end of the current fiscal year, the Town had bonded debt outstanding of approximately \$763,000 as compared to approximately \$837,000 in the prior year, a decrease of \$74,000 or 8.8 percent. (See Table A-4) More information about the Town's long-term debt is presented in Note 6 to the financial statements.

**1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies**

The Town of Gramercy, Louisiana (the "Town") was incorporated on November 27, 1947, and operates under a Mayor-Board of Aldermen form of government. As authorized by its charter, the Town is responsible for public safety, highways and streets, sanitation, public improvements, and general administrative services.

The Town's basic financial statements consist of the government-wide statements and the fund financial statements and the financial statement notes. The statements are prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America as applied to governmental units and promulgated by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board ("GASB") *Codification of Governmental Accounting and Financial Reporting Standards*. Such accounting and reporting procedures conform to the requirements of Louisiana Revised Statute 24:517, to the guidance set forth in the *Louisiana Governmental Accounting Guide*, and to the industry audit guide, *Audits of State and Local Governmental Units* published by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants.

**Financial Reporting Entity**

GASB Statement No. 61, *Defining the Financial Reporting Entity*, establishes criteria for determining the governmental reporting entity and component units that should be included within the reporting entity. Since the Town is a special purpose government that has a separately elected governing body, is legally separate, and is fiscally independent of other state or local governments, it is considered a primary government under the provisions of this Statement. As used in GASB Statement No. 61, fiscally independent means that the Town may, without the approval or consent of another governmental entity, determine or modify its own budget, levy its own taxes or set rates or charges, and issue bonded debt. Additionally, the Town does not have any component units, which are defined by GASB Statement No. 61 as other legally separate organizations for which the elected officials are financially accountable. There are no other primary governments with which the Town has a significant relationship.

The following is a summary of certain significant accounting policies and practices:

**Basis of Presentation, Basis of Accounting**

*Government-wide Statements:* The statement of net position and the statement of activities display information about the Town. These statements include the financial activities of the overall government, except for fiduciary activities. Eliminations have been made to minimize the double-counting of internal activities. These statements distinguish between *the governmental and business-type activities* of the Town. Governmental activities generally are financed through taxes, intergovernmental revenues, and other non-exchange transactions. Business-type activities are financed in whole or in part by fees charged to external parties.

The statement of activities presents a comparison between direct expenses and program revenues for the different business-type activities of the Town and for each function of the Town's governmental activities. Direct expenses are those that are specifically associated with a program or function and, therefore, are clearly identifiable to a particular function. Indirect expense allocations that have been made in the funds have been reversed for the statement of activities. Program revenues include (a) fees, fines, and charges paid by the recipients of goods or services offered by the programs and (b) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular program. Revenues that are not classified as program revenues, including all taxes, are presented as general revenues.

Basis of Presentation, Basis of Accounting (continued)

*Fund Financial Statements:* The fund financial statements provide information about the Town's funds. Separate statements for each fund category - *governmental and proprietary* - are presented. The emphasis of fund financial statements is on major governmental and enterprise funds, each displayed in a separate column.

Proprietary fund operating revenues, such as charges for services, result from exchange transactions associated with the principal activity of the fund. Exchange transactions are those in which each party receives and gives up essentially equal values. Non-operating revenues, such as subsidies and investment earnings, result from non-exchange transactions or ancillary activities.

The Town reports the following major governmental funds:

- a. General Fund - This is the Town's primary operating fund. It accounts for all financial resources of the general government, except those required to be accounted for in another fund.
- b. Sales Tax Fund – The Sales Tax Fund accounts for the receipt and use of proceeds of the Town's one-half percent sales and use tax that was authorized on March 24, 2018. These taxes are dedicated for constructing, improving, extending and maintaining streets, drainage, sewer infrastructure and sewerage treatment works; police department equipment; and purchasing and acquiring the necessary equipment and land for any of the aforesaid public works, improvements and facilities.
- c. American Rescue Plan Fund – The American Rescue Plan Fund accounts for the receipt and use of allocations received for Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds. This federal award has been awarded to state and local governments for certain recovery efforts following the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Town reports the following two major enterprise funds:

Public Utility Revenue Fund and Sewer Operating Fund - These funds are used to account for operations (a) that are financed and operated in a manner similar to private business enterprises - where the intent of the governing body is that the costs (expenses, including depreciation) of providing the goods or services to the general public on a continuing basis be financed or recovered through user charges or (b) where the governing body has decided that periodic determination of revenues earned, expenses incurred, and/or net income is appropriate for capital maintenance, public policy, management control, accountability, or other purposes.

Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting

*Government-wide and Proprietary Fund Financial Statements.* The government-wide and proprietary fund financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus. The government-wide and proprietary fund financial statements are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded at the time liabilities are incurred, regardless of when the related cash flows take place. Non-exchange transactions, in which the Town gives (or receives) value without directly receiving (or giving) equal value in exchange, include property taxes, grants, entitlements, and donations. On an accrual basis, revenue from property taxes is recognized in the fiscal year for which the taxes are levied. Revenue from grants, entitlements, and donations is recognized in the fiscal year in which all eligibility requirements have been satisfied.

Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting (continued)

*Governmental Fund Financial Statements.* The governmental funds are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under this method, revenues are recognized when measurable and available. The Town considers all revenues reported in the governmental funds to be available if the revenues are collected within sixty days after year-end. Property taxes, sales taxes, franchise taxes, licenses, and interest are considered to be susceptible to accrual. Expenditures are recorded when the related fund liability is incurred, except for principal and interest on general long-term debt, claims and judgments, and compensated absences, which are recognized as expenditures to the extent they have matured. General capital asset acquisitions are reported as expenditures in the governmental fund. Proceeds of general long-term debt and acquisitions under capital leases are reported as other financing sources.

Under the terms of grant agreements, the Town funds certain programs by a combination of specific cost-reimbursement grants, categorical block grants, and general revenues. Thus, when program expenses are incurred, there are both restricted and unrestricted net assets available to finance the program. It is the Town's policy to first apply cost-reimbursement grant resources to such programs, followed by categorical block grants, and then by general revenues.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities as of the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Pension Plans

The Town is a participating employer in two cost-sharing, multiple-employer defined benefit pension plans as described in Note 11. For purposes of measuring the net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions, and pension expense, information about the fiduciary net position of each of the plans, and additions to/deductions for the plan's fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by the plan. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments have been reported at fair value within the plan.

Budgets and Budgetary Accounting

The Town follows these procedures in establishing the budgetary data reflected in these financial statements:

1. A proposed budget is prepared and submitted to the Mayor and Board of Aldermen prior to the beginning of each fiscal year.
2. The proposed budget is published in the official journal and made available for public inspection. A public hearing is held to obtain taxpayer comments.

Budgets and Budgetary Accounting (continued)

3. The budget is adopted through the passage of an ordinance prior to the commencement of the fiscal year for which the budget is being adopted.
4. Budgetary amendments involving the transfer of funds from one department, program, or function to another or involving increases in expenditures resulting from revenues exceeding amounts originally estimated require the approval of the Board of Aldermen.
5. All budgetary appropriations lapse at the end of each fiscal year.
6. Budgets for the general, special revenue, and proprietary funds are adopted on bases consistent with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP).
7. Louisiana R.S. 39:1310 requires budgets to be amended when revenue collections plus projected revenue collections for the remainder of a year, within a fund, are failing to meet estimated annual budgeted revenues by five percent or more or expenditures plus projected expenditures for the remainder of the year, within a fund, are exceeding estimated budgeted expenditures by five percent or more.

The level of budgetary control is total appropriations. Budgeted amounts included in the financial statements include the original adopted budget and final amended budget for the general fund, and the original adopted budget for the sales tax fund.

Cash, Cash Equivalents, and Investments

Cash, cash equivalents, and investments include demand deposit accounts, interest-bearing demand accounts, certificates of deposit, and investments in the Louisiana Asset Management Pool (LAMP) with a maturity date within three months of the date of acquisition. Under Louisiana Revised Statutes 39:1271 and 33:2955, the Town may deposit funds in demand deposit accounts, interest-bearing demand deposit accounts, and time certificates of deposit with state banks organized under Louisiana law and national banks having principal offices in Louisiana. In addition, local governments in Louisiana are authorized to invest in the Louisiana Asset Management Pool, Inc., a nonprofit corporation formed by an initiative of the State Treasury and organized under the laws of the State of Louisiana, which operates a local government investment pool.

Under State Law, the Town may invest in certificates of deposits. These are classified as cash equivalents if the original maturities are 90 days or less; however, if their original maturity exceed 90 days, these are classified as investments. Investments are stated at cost and approximate fair value.

Restricted Assets

Certain customer meter deposits, debt service sinking funds, and ad valorem tax collections are legally restricted as to purpose. These assets have been classified as restricted assets on the Statement of Net Position since the use of these funds is limited by applicable deposit agreements, bond covenants, and tax millages.

Capital Assets

Capital assets, which include property, plant, equipment, and infrastructure assets with an acquisition value greater than \$1,000 are reported in the applicable governmental or business-type activity columns in the government-wide financial statements. Purchased or constructed capital assets are reported at cost or estimated historical cost, except for right-to-use lease assets, which is measured at the present value of payments expected to be made. Donated fixed assets are recorded at their estimated acquisition value at the date of donation. The cost of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend assets' lives are not capitalized.

Capital Assets are depreciated using the straight-line method over the following estimated useful lives:

Right-to-Use Lease Assets are amortized using the straight-line method over the lesser of the estimated useful life described above or the term of the lease.

The proprietary fund type operations are accounted for on a cost of services or "capital maintenance" measurement focus, and all assets and liabilities (whether current or non-current) associated with their activity are included on their balance sheets.

Depreciation of all exhaustible fixed assets used by the proprietary funds is charged as an expense against their operations. Depreciation has been provided over the assets' estimated useful lives using the straight-line method. The estimated useful lives are as follows:

Accounts Receivable

Uncollectible amounts due from customers for utility services are recognized through the establishment of an allowance for uncollectible accounts at the time information becomes available which indicates the uncollectibility of the particular receivable.

Accumulated Leave

Town employees accumulate varying amounts of annual and sick leave each year, depending upon their length of service with the Town.

**Annual Leave**

The Town uses a calendar year for determining the earning and utilization of annual leave hours. Town employees are credited their entire year's annual leave hours on the first day of the calendar year. Should an employee terminate their employment during the year, they would be paid for all un-used annual hours that were earned to that date. Annual leave hours must be used or paid in the year earned.

**Sick Leave**

Employees are credited their entire year's sick hours on the first day of the calendar year. Employees can accrue up to a maximum of 1,040 hours of sick leave. Upon termination or resignation any accrual of hours will not be paid out.

GASB Statement No. 101, *Compensated Absences*, requires governments to accrue a liability for compensated leave that has not been used if all of the following are true: (1) the leave is attributable to services already rendered; (2) the leave accumulates; and (3) the leave is more likely than not to be used for time off or otherwise paid in cash or settled through non-cash means.

The Town has recorded the following liabilities, including the salary-related benefits associated with the payment of compensated absences as of June 30, 2025:

- Sick leave that is expected to be used based on years of service and a three-year average of hours not forfeited multiplied by current pay rates.
- Vacation leave earned based on years of service multiplied by current year pay rates.

In the government-wide financial statements and the proprietary fund financial statements, the total compensated absences liability is recorded as an expense and a long-term obligation and allocated on a functional basis. A current liability is recorded for the value of the average prior accumulate leave taken in a year. No liability is recorded in the governmental fund financial statements.

Long-Term Liabilities

In the government-wide Statement of Net Position and in the proprietary fund types' financial statements, long-term debt and other long-term obligations are reported as liabilities. Bond issuance costs, excluding any prepaid bond insurance, are reported as expense in the year of debt issuance. Bonded debt premiums, discounts, and gains (losses) on refundings are deferred and amortized over the life of the bonds using the effective interest method. Bonds payable is reported net of the applicable bond premium or discount.

In the fund financial statements, governmental fund types recognize bond premiums, discounts, and bond issuance costs during the current financial reporting period. The face amount of the debt issue is reported as "other financing sources." Premiums received on debt issuances are reported as "other financing sources" and discounts on debt are reported as "other financing uses."

Long-Term Liabilities (continued)

Excess revenue contracts, loans, and notes are obligations of the general government and payment of these debts are normally provided by transfers from the General Fund to a debt service fund. However, if a debt is intended to be repaid by an enterprise fund it is recorded as a proprietary long-term debt.

Ad valorem tax revenue bonds are secured by ad valorem tax revenues. For those issues not associated with enterprise fund operations, payment of the debt is provided by ad valorem tax revenue recognized in the appropriate governmental fund. Ad valorem tax revenue bond issues associated with enterprise funds are accounted for in the relevant enterprise fund.

Leases

The Town is a lessee for noncancellable leases of office space and equipment. The Town recognizes a lease liability and an intangible right-to-use lease asset (lease asset) in the government-wide financial statements. The Town recognizes lease liabilities with an initial, individual value of \$5,000 or more.

At the commencement of a lease, the Town initially measures the lease liability at the present value of payments to be expected to be made during the lease term. Subsequently, the lease liability is reduced by the principal portion of lease payments made. The lease asset is initially measured as the initial amount of the lease liability, adjusted for lease payments made at or before the lease commencement date, plus certain initial direct costs. Subsequently, the lease asset is amortized on a straight-line basis over the shorter of its useful life or the life of the lease.

Key estimates and judgments related to leases include how the Town determines (1) the discount rate it uses to discount the expected lease payments to present value, (2) lease term, and (3) lease payments.

- The Town uses the interest rate charged by the lessor as the discount rate. When the interest rate charged by the lessor is not determinable, the Town generally uses its estimated incremental borrowing rate as the discount rate for leases.
- The lease term includes the noncancellable period of the lease. Lease payments included in the measurement of the lease liability are composed of fixed payments and purchase option price that the Town is reasonably certain to exercise.

The Town monitors changes in circumstances that would require a remeasurement of its lease and will remeasure the lease asset and lease liability if certain changes occur that are expected to significantly affect the amount of the lease liability.

Subscription-Based Information Technology Arrangements (“SBITA”)

In accordance with GASB Statement No. 96, *Subscription-based Information Technology Arrangements (“SBITA”)*, the Town recognizes a right to use subscription asset and a corresponding subscription liability for those arrangements with an initial individual value that is material to the financial statements and whose terms call for a subscription period greater than one year. The subscription liability is initially measured at the present value of subscription payments expected to be made during the subscription term. Future subscription payments are discounted using the interest rate the SBITA vendor charges to the Town or the Town’s incremental borrowing rate. The right to use subscription asset is initially measured as the sum of (1) the initial subscription liability amounts, (2) payments made to the SBITA vendor before commencement of the subscription term, and (3) capitalizable implementation costs, less any incentives received from the SBITA vendor at or before the commencement of the subscription term. The subscription term includes the noncancellable period of the SBITA.

Interfund Balances / Transfers

During the course of normal operations, the Town has transactions between funds, including expenditures and transfers of resources to provide services, purchase assets and service debt. Advances between funds which are not expected to be repaid are accounted for as transfers. In those cases, where repayment is expected, the transfers are accounted for through the various due from and due to accounts.

Deferred Outflows / Inflows of Resources

The statement of financial position includes a separate section for deferred outflows and (or) deferred inflows of financial resources. *Deferred outflows* of resources, represents a consumption of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (expense/expenditure) until then. *Deferred inflows* of resources represent an acquisition of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that time.

The Town’s deferred outflows and inflows of resources on the statement of net position are a result of deferrals concerning pensions and other post-employment benefits.

Note 11 presents detailed information concerning the amounts related to pensions reported in the deferred inflows and deferred outflows sections of the statement of net position. Note 13 presents detailed information concerning the amounts related to other post-employment benefits reported in the deferred inflows and deferred outflows sections of the statement of net position.

Statements of Cash Flows

For purposes of the statements of cash flows, the Town considers all highly liquid investments (including restricted assets) with original maturities of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Equity Classifications

*Government-wide Statements:* In the government-wide statements, equity is classified as net position and displayed in three components:

- a. Net investment in capital assets – Consists of capital assets including restricted capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balances of any bonds, mortgages, notes, or other borrowings that are attributable to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets.
- b. Restricted net position – Consists of net position with constraints placed on the use either by (1) external groups such as creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments; or (2) law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.
- c. Unrestricted net position – All other net position that do not meet the definition of “restricted” or “net investment in capital assets.”

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use for a particular project or service, it is the Town’s policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as they are needed.

*Fund Financial Statements:* In the fund financial statements, governmental fund equity is classified as fund balance. As such, fund balance of the governmental funds is further classified as follows:

- a. Nonspendable – amounts that cannot be spent either because they are in non-spendable form or because they are legally or contractually required to be maintained intact.
- b. Restricted – amounts that can be spent only for specific purposes because of constitutional provisions or enabling legislation or because of constraints that are externally imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or the laws or regulations of other governments.
- c. Committed – amounts that can be used only for specific purposes determined by a formal decision of the Board of Aldermen, which is the highest level of decision-making authority.
- d. Assigned – amounts that do not meet the criteria to be classified as restricted or committed but that are intended to be used for specific purposes by the Board of Aldermen.
- e. Unassigned – all other spendable amounts.

When expenditures are incurred for the purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted amounts are available, the Town reduces restricted amounts first, followed by unrestricted amounts. When expenditures are incurred for purposes for which committed, assigned, or unassigned amounts are available, the Town reduces committed amounts first, followed by assigned amounts, and finally unassigned amounts, as needed, unless the Town has provided otherwise in its committed or assignment actions.

Encumbrances

Encumbrance accounting, under which contracts and other commitments for the expenditure of monies are recorded in order to reserve that portion of the applicable appropriation, is not employed by the Town.

Risk Management

The Town is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; business interruption; errors and omissions; employee injuries and illnesses; natural disasters; and employee health, dental, and accident benefits. The Town carries commercial insurance for all risks of loss.

Arbitrage Liability

Section 148 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, requires that issuers of tax-exempt debt make arbitrage calculations annually on bond issues issued after August 31, 1986, to determine whether an arbitrage rebate liability exists between the issuer and the U.S. Department of Treasury. Arbitrage is the difference (or profit) earned from borrowing funds at tax-exempt rates and investing the proceeds in higher yielding taxable securities. There are no arbitrage rebate liabilities outstanding to the U.S. Department of Treasury for Town issues at June 30, 2025.

Current Year Adoption of New Accounting Standards

The Town adopted GASB Statement 101, *Compensated Absences*. This Statement is intended to meet the informational needs of financial statement users by updating the recognition and measurement guidance for compensated absences. The adoption of GASB 101 required a restatement of the June 30, 2024 net position. The net effect of the Town's net position in its government-wide financial statements for the prior year that resulted from this adoption is as follows:

The Town adopted GASB Statement No. 102, *Certain Risk Disclosures*. This statement aims to provide users of financial statements with information that is currently not often provided by requiring disclosure of certain concentrations or constraints and related events that have occurred or have begun to occur that make a government vulnerable to a substantial impact. The adoption of this standard did not have an impact on the Town's financial statements.

**2. Cash, Cash Equivalents, and Investments**

Cash and Cash Equivalents

At June 30, 2025, the carrying amounts of the Town's cash and cash equivalents were as follows:

Under state law, these deposits must be secured by either federal deposit insurance or by the pledge of securities owned by a fiscal agent bank. The market value of the pledged securities plus the federal deposit insurance must at all times equal the amount on deposit with the fiscal agent bank. Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a financial institution failure, the Town's deposits may not be returned to them. To mitigate this risk, state law requires deposits to be secured by federal deposit insurance of the pledge of securities owned by the fiscal agent financial institution. At year-end, the Town's bank balance was \$1,280,713. Of this amount, \$487,387 was covered by federal depository insurance, and \$793,326 was collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution's trust department or agent in the Town's name. Securities that may be pledged as collateral consist of obligations of the U.S. Government and its agencies, obligations of the State of Louisiana and its municipalities and school districts.

Investments

At June 30, 2025, the Town is invested in an external investment pool, Louisiana Asset Management Pool. The Town's investment in the pool at June 30, 2025 is \$3,521,079.

LAMP is administered by LAMP, Inc., a non-profit corporation organized under the laws of the state of Louisiana. Only local government entities having contracted to participate in LAMP have an investment interest in its pool of assets. The primary objective of LAMP is to provide a safe environment for the placement of public funds in short-term, high quality investments. The LAMP portfolio includes only securities and other obligations in which local governments in Louisiana are authorized to invest in accordance with LA-R.S. 33:2955.

Investments (continued)

LAMP is a governmental investment pool that reports at fair value. The investments are measured at the net asset value. The following facts are relevant for investment pools:

Credit risk: LAMP is rated AAAM by Standard & Poor's.

Custodial credit risk: LAMP participants' investments in the pool are evidenced by shares of the pool. Investments in pools should be disclosed, but not categorized because they are not evidenced by securities that exist in physical or book-entry form. The public entity's investment is with the pool, not the securities that make up the pool; therefore, no public disclosure is required.

Concentration of credit risk: Pooled investments are excluded from the five percent disclosure requirement.

Interest rate risk: LAMP is designed to be highly liquid to give its participants immediate access to their account balances. LAMP prepares its own interest rate risk disclosure using the weighted average maturity (WAM) method. The WAM of LAMP assets is restricted to not more than 90 days and consists of no securities with a maturity in excess of 397 days or 762 days for U.S. Government floating/variable rate investments. The WAM of LAMP's total investments is 55 days (from LAMP's monthly Portfolio Holdings) as of June 30, 2025.

Foreign currency risk: Not applicable. LAMP complies with the provisions of Louisiana Law concerning permissible investments for municipalities, parishes and other political subdivisions set forth in La R.S. 33:2955 and the investment policy does not provide for investment in foreign obligations.

The investments in LAMP are stated at fair value based on quoted market prices. The fair value is determined on a weekly basis by LAMP and the value of the position in the external investment pools is the same as the net asset value of the pool shares.

LAMP, Inc. is subject to the regulatory oversight of the state treasurer and the board of directors. LAMP is not registered with the SEC as an investment company.

An annual audit of LAMP is conducted by the Louisiana Legislative Auditor. The Legislative Auditor of the State of Louisiana has full access to the records of LAMP. LAMP issues financial reports which can be obtained by writing: LAMP, Inc., 650 Poydras St., Suite 2220, New Orleans, LA 70130.

**9. Ad Valorem Taxes**

Ad valorem taxes attach as enforceable liens on all applicable property on February 28<sup>th</sup> of each year. Taxes are levied and are billed to the taxpayers in November of each year. Billed ad valorem taxes become delinquent on January 1<sup>st</sup> of the following calendar year.

The Town bills and collects its own property taxes using the assessed values determined by the tax assessor of St. James Parish. During the year ended June 30, 2025, taxes of 9.65 mills were levied on property with assessed valuations totaling \$22,392,542, and 5.91 mills are levied for general purposes. Within the 5.91 mills are funds designated for the repayment of the \$500,000 water improvement bonds. Additional taxes of 3.74 mills for the \$1.5 million water improvement bonds were levied on the same property for the purpose of accumulating enough funds to service the annual debt requirements as they become due. Levied mills expire at the expiration of each debt requirement.

Ad valorem taxes levied during the year ended June 30, 2025, totaled approximately \$217,000.

**11. Pension and Retirement Plans**

The Town is a participating employer in two cost-sharing defined benefit pension plans. These plans are administered by two public employee retirement systems, the Municipal Employees' Retirement System of Louisiana (MERS) and the Municipal Police Employees' Retirement System (MPERS). Article X, Section 29(F) of the Louisiana Constitution of 1974 assigns the authority to establish and amend benefit provisions of these plans to the State Legislature. Each system is administered by a separate board of trustees.

**Plan Descriptions:**

**Municipal Employees' Retirement System of Louisiana (MERS)**

MERS is the administrator of a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan. The plan provides retirement, disability, and survivor benefits to eligible state employees as defined in LRS 11:1732. The age and years of creditable service required in order for a member to receive retirement benefits are established by LRS 11:1801.

**Municipal Police Employees' Retirement System (MPERS)**

MPERS is the administrator of a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan. The plan provides retirement benefits for municipal police officers. The projections of benefit payments in the calculation of the total pension liability includes all benefits to be provided to current active and inactive employees through the System in accordance with benefit terms and any additional legal agreements to provide benefits that are in force at the measurement date. Benefit provisions are authorized within Act 189 of 1973 and amended by LRS 11:2211- 11:2233.

**Funding Policy**

Article X, Section 29(E)(2)(a) of the Louisiana Constitution of 1974 assigns the Legislature the authority to determine employee contributions. Employer contributions are actuarially determined using statutorily established methods on an annual basis and are constitutionally required to cover the employer's portion of the normal cost and provide for the amortization of the unfunded accrued liability. Employer contributions are adopted by the Legislature annually upon recommendation of the Public Retirement Systems' Actuarial Committee (PRSAC).

Contributions to the plans are required and determined by State statute (which may be amended) and are expressed as a percentage of covered payroll. The contribution rates in effect for the year ended June 30, 2025, for the Town and covered employees were as follows:

**Discount Rate**

The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that plan member contributions will be made at the current contribution rate and that sponsor contributions will be made at rates equal to the difference between actuarially determined contribution rates and the member rate. Based on those assumptions, each of the pension plan’s fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments of current plan members. Therefore, the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability. The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability for MERS and MPERS was 6.850% and 6.750%, respectively, for the year ended June 30, 2024.

**Sensitivity of the Employer’s Proportionate Share of the Net Pension Liability to Changes in the Discount Rate**

**12. Restricted Assets**

Under the terms of the bond indentures for the water revenue bonds and the sewer improvement refunding bonds, certain revenues are dedicated to the retirement of said bonds and are to be set aside into special accounts after provisions have been made for the payment of the reasonable and necessary expenses of operating and maintaining the utility systems totaling \$110,764.

In addition to the above, at June 30, 2025, the Town also has \$114,341 of cash restricted for the refunding of customer meter deposits.

**13. Post-employment Health Care and Life Insurance Benefits**

**General Information about the OPEB Plan**

*Plan description* – The Town provides certain continuing health care and life insurance benefits for its retired employees. The Town’s OPEB Plan is a single-employer defined benefit OPEB plan administered by the Town. The authority to establish and/or amend the obligation of the employer, employees and retirees rests with the Town. No assets are accumulated in a trust that meets the criteria in GASB Codification Section P52 *Post-employment Benefits Other Than Pensions—Reporting For Benefits Not Provided Through Trusts That Meet Specified Criteria—Defined Benefit*.

*Benefits Provided* – Medical insurance benefits are provided through comprehensive plans and are made available to employees upon actual retirement. Employees retirement eligibility (D.R.O.P. entry) provisions are as follows: attainment of Medical benefits is provided through a self-insured medical plan and are made available to employees upon actual retirement. The employees are covered by one of two retirement systems: first, the Municipal Employees' Retirement System of Louisiana, whose retirement eligibility (D.R.O.P. entry) provisions are as follows: 25 years of service at any age; or, age 60 and 10 years of service; and second, the Municipal Police Retirement System of Louisiana, whose retirement eligibility (D.R.O.P. entry) provisions are as follows: 25 years of service at any age; age 50 and 20 years of services; or, age 55 and 12 years of service. For each system, employees hired on or after January 1, 2013 must meet the following retirement (D.R.O.P. entry) requirements: age 55 and 30 years of services; age 62 and 10 years of services; or age 67 and 7 years of services. Notwithstanding this, there is a minimum services requirement of 10 years for benefits.

**14. Tax Abatement**

The Governmental Accounting Standards Board issued GASB Statement 104, *Disclosure of Certain Capital Assets*. This Statement requires certain types of capital assets to be disclosed separately in the capital asset note disclosures required by Statement No. 34. These assets include lease assets, Public-Public and Public-Private Partnerships and Availability Payment Arrangements, and subscription-based information technology arrangements. This statement also requires additional disclosures for capital assets held for sale. The Town will include the requirements of this standard, as applicable, in its June 30, 2026 financial statement.

A *material weakness* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. A *significant deficiency* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses, or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that were not identified.

## **Report on Compliance and Other Matters**

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Town's financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the financial statements. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

### **Purpose of this Report**

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control or on compliance. 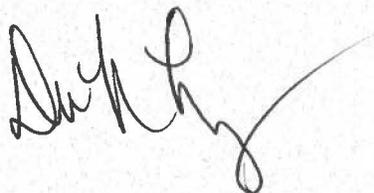

We have audited the financial statements of the Town of Gramercy (“Town”) for the year ended June 30, 2025, and have issued our report thereon dated December 17, 2025. As part of our audit, we gain an understanding of internal accounting controls for the purpose of determining our ability to rely on those controls and to establish a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Town’s internal control.

The objective of internal control is to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance as to the safeguarding of assets against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and the reliability of the financial records for preparing financial statements and maintaining accountability for assets. The concept of reasonable assurance recognizes that the cost of a system of internal accounting control should not exceed the benefits derived and also recognizes that the evaluation of these factors necessarily requires estimates and judgments by management.

No matter how good a system is, there are inherent limitations that should be recognized in considering the potential effectiveness of internal accounting. In the performance of most control procedures, errors can result from misunderstanding of instructions, mistakes of judgment, carelessness, or other personal factors. Control procedures whose effectiveness depends upon segregation of duties can be circumvented by collusion. Similarly, control procedures can be circumvented intentionally by management either with respect to the execution and recording of transactions or with respect to the estimates and judgments required in the preparation of financial statements. Further, projection of any evaluation of internal accounting control to future periods is subject to the risk that the degree of compliance with the procedures may deteriorate. We say this simply to suggest that any system needs to be constantly reviewed and improved where necessary.

However, during the course of our audit, we became aware of a matter that is an opportunity for strengthening internal controls or operating efficiency. Our comment and suggestion regarding this matter is set forth below. This letter does not affect our reports dated December 17, 2025, on the financial statements of the Town’s internal control over financial reporting.

**ML-25-001                      Financial Reconciliations and Review**

**Condition:**                      During the audit, we noted the Town did not reconcile its year end receivable aging report to the general ledger timely. Additionally, the Town’s investment account and credit card statements were reconciled but lacked documentation of timely review.

**Recommendations:**        The Town should reconcile and adjust receivables general ledger balance at year end to agree to aging reports. All reviews should be documented (signed/dated) as evidence that it was performed and performed timely.

**Management Response:** *We concur with the recommendation above.*

**Review of Service Organization Control (SOC) Reports**

**Condition:**

During the audit, we noted that the Town did not perform a review of the SOC 1 Type 2 reports for third-party service providers that process financial transactions on behalf of the Town. SOC 1 reports provide assurance over the design and operating effectiveness of controls at service organizations that are relevant to user entities' financial reporting.

**Recommendations:**

The Town should establish and document a formal process to obtain and review SOC 1 Type 2 reports for all significant service providers. The review should include a review of the complementary user entity controls and ensure they are implemented and operating effectively. Implementing this process will help ensure that outsourced activities are subject to appropriate oversight and that internal controls over financial reporting remain effective.

*Management Response: We concur with the recommendation above.*

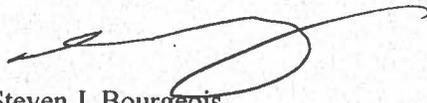
