Independent Accountant's Review Report

We have reviewed the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and the major fund of Twentieth Judicial District Court – Judicial Expense Fund, as of and for the year ended December 31, 2019, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise Twentieth Judicial District Court – Judicial Expense Fund's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. A review includes primarily applying analytical procedures to management's financial data and making inquiries of management. A review is substantially less in scope than an audit, the objective of which is the expression of an opinion regarding the financial statements as a whole. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting; this includes determining that the modified cash basis of accounting is an acceptable basis for the preparation of the financial statements in the circumstances. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement whether due to fraud or error.

Accountant's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to conduct the review engagement in accordance with Statements on Standards for Accounting and Review Services promulgated by the Accounting and Review Services Committee of the AICPA. Those standards require us to perform procedures to obtain limited assurance as a basis for reporting whether we are aware of any material modifications that should be made to the financial statements for them to be in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting. We believe that the results of our procedures provide a reasonable basis for our conclusion.

Accountant's Conclusion

Based on our review, we are not aware of any material modifications that should be made to the accompanying financial statements in order for them to be in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting.

Basis of Accounting

We draw attention to Note 1 of the financial statements, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our conclusion is not modified with respect to this matter.

Required Supplementary Information

The budgetary comparison schedule on page 17 is presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a required part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic

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financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. Such information is the responsibility of management. We have not audited, reviewed, or compiled the required supplementary information, and we do not express an opinion, a conclusion, nor provide any assurance on it.

Management has omitted the management's discussion and analysis. Such missing information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context.

Supplementary Information

The accompanying schedule of compensation, benefits, and other payments to agency head or chief executive officer is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from, and relates directly to, the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The supplementary information has been subjected to the review procedures applied in our review of the basic financial statements. We are not aware of any material modifications that should be made to the supplementary information. We have not audited the supplementary information and do not express an opinion on such information.

Introduction

The Twentieth Judicial District Court ("the Court") Judicial Expense Fund ("the Judicial Expense Fund") was established by Louisiana Revised Statute ("R.S.") 13:996.60 for the administration of the Court and the offices of the Court's individual judges. The parishes of East Feliciana and West Feliciana compose the Twentieth Judicial District.

Note 1-Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

A. Reporting Entity

The accompanying financial statements reflect financial activity of the Court relating only to the Judicial Expense Fund and do not present any other information on the Court or the governing bodies of East Feliciana Parish and West Feliciana Parish.

B. Basis of Presentation

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting. Modifications to the cash basis of accounting include recording capital assets and their related depreciation. Accordingly, revenue is recognized when received and expenditures are recognized when paid.

Government-wide Financial Statements – The Statement of Assets and Net Position – Modified Cash Basis and the Statement of Revenue and Expenses – Modified Cash Basis display information about the reporting entity as a whole. The government-wide financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus. With this measurement focus, all assets and liabilities, whether current or noncurrent, are included in the statement of assets and net position and the operating statement presents increases (revenue) and decreases (expenses) in net position.

Fund Financial Statements – The governmental fund Statement of Assets and Fund Balance – Modified Cash Basis and the governmental fund Statement of Revenue, Expenditures and Change in Fund Balance – Modified Cash Basis are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus.

C. Capital Assets

In the government-wide financial statements, capital assets purchased or acquired with an original cost of \$500 or more are capitalized and reported at historical cost. Additions, improvements and other capital outlays that significantly extend the useful life of an asset are capitalized. Costs incurred for repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred. Depreciation on all assets is provided on the straight-line basis over the following estimated useful lives:

Office furniture and equipment 3 - 7 years

In the fund financial statements, capital assets are accounted for as capital outlay expenditures of the fund upon acquisition.

D. Equity Classifications

In the government-wide financial statements, equity is classified as net position and displayed in three components:

- a. Net investment in capital assets consists of capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation, reduced by the outstanding balances of bonds, mortgages, notes, or other borrowings that are attributable to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets.
- b. Restricted net position consists of net position with constraints placed on the use either by (1) external groups such as creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments; or (2) law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.
- c. Unrestricted net position consists of the net amount of assets and liabilities that do not meet the definition of the above two components and is available for general use by the Judicial Expense Fund.

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the Judicial Expense Fund's policy to first use restricted resources then unrestricted resources as they are needed.

In the fund financial statements, governmental fund equity is classified as fund balance and displayed in five components. The following classifications describe the relative strength of the spending constraints placed on the purposes for which resources can be used.

- a. Nonspendable fund balance amounts that are not in a spendable form (such as prepaid expenses) or are required to be maintained intact;
- b. Restricted fund balance amounts constrained to specific purposes by their providers (such as grantors, bondholders, and higher levels of government), through constitutional provisions, or by enabling legislation;
- c. Committed fund balance amounts constrained to specific purposes by a government itself, using its highest level of decision-making authority; to be reported as committed, amounts cannot be used for any other purpose unless the government takes the same highest-level action to remove or change the constraint;
- d. Assigned fund balance amounts a government intends to use for a specific purpose; intent can be expressed by the governing body or by an official or body to which the governing body delegates the authority; and
- e. Unassigned fund balance amounts that are available for any purpose.

When an expenditure is incurred for which committed, assigned, or unassigned fund balances are available, the Judicial Expense Fund considers amounts to have been spent first out of committed funds, then assigned funds, and finally, unassigned funds, as needed, unless the Judicial Expense Fund has provided otherwise in its commitment or assignment actions.

E. Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Note 3-Pension Plan

The Judicial Expense Fund contributes to the Louisiana State Employees' Retirement System ("LASERS"). As of December 31, 2019, the Judicial Expense Fund's proportionate share of the net pension liability of LASERS was \$791,434. The net pension liability was measured as of June 30, 2019.

Note 4-Subsequent Events

Management of the Judicial Expense Fund has evaluated subsequent events through June 26, 2020, the date on which the financial statements were available to be issued. As a result of the spread of a novel coronavirus (COVID-19), economic uncertainties have arisen that could negatively impact the Judicial Expense Fund's financial condition. The potential financial impact is unknown at this time.

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Independent Accountant's Report on Applying Agreed-upon Procedures

To Twentieth Judicial District Court – Judicial Expense Fund and the Louisiana Legislative Auditor:

We have performed the procedures enumerated below, which were agreed to by Twentieth Judicial District Court – Judicial Expense Fund and the Louisiana Legislative Auditor (the specified parties), on the Judicial Expense Fund's compliance with certain laws and regulations contained in the accompanying Louisiana Attestation Questionnaire during the fiscal year ended December 31, 2019, as required by Louisiana Revised Statute 24:513 and the *Louisiana Governmental Audit Guide*. The Judicial Expense Fund's management is responsible for its financial records and compliance with applicable laws and regulations. The sufficiency of these procedures is solely the responsibility of the specified parties. Consequently, we make no representation regarding the sufficiency of the procedures enumerated below either for the purpose for which this report has been requested or for any other purpose.

The procedures and associated findings are as follows:

Public Bid Law

1) Obtain documentation for all expenditures made during the year for materials and supplies exceeding \$30,000, and public works exceeding \$157,700. Compare the documentation for these expenditures to Louisiana Revised Statute (R.S.) 39:1551-39:1775 (the state procurement code) or R.S. 38:2211-2296 (the public bid law), whichever is applicable; and report whether the expenditures were made in accordance with these laws.

No expenditures for materials and supplies were made during the year that exceeded \$30,000, nor were there any expenditures for public works made during the year that exceeded \$157,700.

Code of Ethics for Public Officials and Public Employees

2) Obtain a list of the immediate family members of each board member as defined by R.S. 42:1101-1124 (the ethics law).

Management provided the requested information.

Management represented that the Judicial Expense Fund was not on the noncompliance list at any time during the fiscal year. Management further represented that the Judicial Expense Fund did not enter into any contracts during the fiscal year that were subject to the public bid law.

Prior-Year Comments

Management represented that the prior year exception related to an unfavorable budget variance for the year ended December 31, 2018 has been resolved.

This agreed-upon procedures engagement was conducted in accordance with attestation standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, and the standards applicable to attestation engagements contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the United States Comptroller General. We were not engaged to and did not conduct an examination or review, the objective of which would be the expression of an opinion or conclusion, respectively, on the Judicial Expense Fund's compliance with the foregoing matters. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion or conclusion. Had we performed additional procedures, other matters might have come to our attention that would have been reported to you.

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of testing performed on the Judicial Expense Fund's compliance with certain laws and regulations contained in the accompanying Louisiana Attestation Questionnaire, as required by Louisiana Revised Statute 24:513 and the *Louisiana Governmental Audit Guide*, and the result of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on control or compliance. Accordingly, this report is not suitable for any other purpose. Under Louisiana Revised Statute 24:513, this report is distributed by the Louisiana Legislative Auditor as a public document.
