Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Slaughter Community Charter School, which comprise the statements of financial position as of June 30, 2019 and 2018, and the related statements of activities and changes in net assets, functional expenses, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audits to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Slaughter Community Charter School as of June 30, 2019 and 2018, and the changes in its net assets and cash flows for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements as a whole. The accompanying schedules of expenditures of federal awards, as required by Title 2 U.S. *Code of Federal Regulations* Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Awards*, and Schedule of Compensation, Benefits and other Payments to the School Leader, are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

The Performance and Statistical Data and the Statewide Agreed Upon Procedures are not a required part of the basic financial statements but are supplementary information required by Louisiana State Law. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. We have applied certain limited procedures, which are described in the Independent Accountant's Report on Applying Agreed-Upon Procedures. However we did not audit this information and, accordingly, express no opinion on it.

Other Reporting Required by *Government Auditing Standards*

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated September 29, 2019, on our consideration of Slaughter Community Charter School's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering Slaughter Community Charter School's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Organization

Slaughter Community Charter School (the School) was incorporated on September 2, 2009 as a non-profit corporation under the laws of the State of Louisiana. The School operates under a charter in East Feliciana Parish that expires June 30, 2023 and may be renewed for successive periods by the East Feliciana School Board. The school has grades 7th through 12th.

(b) Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the School have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and accordingly reflect all significant receivables, payables and other liabilities.

(c) Revenues

The School receives the majority of its revenue from the Minimum Foundation Program (MFP) which passes through the East Feliciana Parish School Board. The amount of the MFP funding is based on an allocation of funds provided by the State of Louisiana and local taxes. The School also receives federal and private sector funding. Federal funds are passed through the Louisiana Department of Education or the East Feliciana School Board.

The School also receives revenue in the form of student and athletic activities revenues. These revenues are collected from students who participate in social events and after school clubs. Additional revenue is received from patrons attending school sponsored sporting events. These funds are used to help cover the cost of hosting these events and provide compensation for teachers, chaperons, referees, or other personnel required to officiate or supervise these activities.

(d) Net Assets

The School reports information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets:

Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions are net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed restrictions and are available for use at the organization's discretion

Net Assets With Donor Restrictions are net assets subject to donor-imposed restrictions that may or will be met by either actions of the organization or the passage of time. Once the restrictions are met they are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions. The School has \$0 and \$318,915 in net assets with donor restrictions as of June 30, 2019 and 2018, respectively.

(e) Recently Issued Accounting Standards

On August 18, 2016, the FASB issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2016-14, *Not-for-Profit Entities (Topic 958): Presentation of Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Entities*. Among other provisions, ASU 2016-14 reduces the number of classes of net assets from three to two, requires the presentation of expenses in both natural and functional classifications, and requires the disclosure of both quantitative and qualitative information about the availability of and how the organization manages its liquid available resources to meet cash needs for general expenditures within one year of the balance sheet date.

(f) Cash

Cash consists of bank deposits held with financial institutions and cash on hand.

(g) Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable represent amounts due under the MFP or federal and state programs. The school provides an allowance for doubtful accounts based upon a review of outstanding amounts due, age of the balance, and likelihood of collectability. Any balances deemed uncollectible are charged against the allowance account. There was no allowance for doubtful accounts for the years ended June 30, 2019 and 2018.

(h) Functional Expenses

The School allocates its expenses on a functional basis among its various programs. Expenses that can be identified with a specified program, such as curriculum supplies, are allocated directly according to their natural expense classification. Other expenses that are attributable to both the program and supporting functions are allocated based on management's estimates of time and effort.

(i) Income Taxes

The School accounts for income taxes in accordance with FASB ASC 740-10, *Accounting for Uncertainty in Income Taxes*. Management believes it has no material uncertain tax positions and, accordingly has not recognized a liability for any unrecognized tax benefits.

The School is a not-for-profit organization that is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

The School files information returns in the U.S. federal jurisdiction and in various other states. The School is no longer subject to federal information return examinations by tax authorities for years before 2015.

(j) Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that effect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

(k) Subsequent Events

In preparing these financial statements, the School has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through September 29, 2019, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

2. Concentrations

The School receives the majority of its operating revenue from the State of Louisiana and East Feliciana Parish School Board in the form of Minimum Foundation program funding. The School also receives funding from federal and state agencies under various programs and private foundations. The percentage of revenue and receivables in excess of 10% from these sources is as follows:

Financial instruments, which potentially subject the School to concentration of credit risk, consist of cash accounts held with a bank and a money market account held with a credit union. Cash accounts held with a bank are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) for up to \$250,000. Cash deposits in excess of FDIC insured limits at June 30, 2019 and 2018 were approximately \$942,799 and \$2,015,275, respectively. The School does not believe that it is exposed to any significant credit risk on uninsured amounts.

3. Leases

Until a permanent building was secured, the School had leased temporary buildings for classrooms and administrative offices. As the School has grown there has been an increased need for space which has required additional leases. Starting in July 2016, lease payments began being paid month to month as construction was ongoing. These temporary buildings were completely removed during the year ended June 30, 2018.

Total rental expense under these leases for the year ended June 30, 2019 and 2018 was \$0 and \$4,877, respectively. Total accrued tear down costs for these temporary buildings at June 30, 2019 and 2018 were \$0 and \$22,016, respectively.

The School has entered into a three year lease agreement for office equipment at a monthly rental amount of \$315. The school has the option to cancel this lease at any time with a thirty day notice. Total rental expense under this lease for the year ended June 30, 2019 and 2018 was \$14,368 and \$13,047, respectively.

4. Property and Equipment

Property and equipment is presented in the financial statements on the basis of cost less allowances for depreciation. The School capitalizes all expenditures of depreciable assets where cost exceeds \$500. Depreciation is computed using the straight line method and is provided over the estimated useful lives of the assets, which is generally three to thirty nine years.

All property and equipment purchased with Louisiana Department of Education funds are owned by the School. However, these assets would revert back to the Louisiana Department of Education should the charter not be renewed.

5. Compensated Absences

For those eligible the School will pay out a maximum of four days of unused vacation upon termination. At June 30, 2019 and 2018 there was a total of \$27,767 and \$58,364 accrued for unused vacation.

6. Retirement Plan (continued)

The School offers a retirement benefit plan with the Teacher's Retirement System of Louisiana (TRSL) for employees that are eligible to participate and operates as a defined benefit contribution pension plan. TRSL issues a its own separate financial statements and supplementary information which are publically available and can be obtained by writing or calling the plan.

Benefits vest after five years of service for participants age sixty or older and after 20 years of service for all other participants. Benefits under the plan are established and amended by state statute. Retirement benefits are based upon the employee's age, last three years of compensation, and the total number of years the participate was contributing to the TRSL. Once participants reach retirement age a total of eight different payout options are available. The plan also provides death and disability benefits for surviving spouses or disabled employees.

The School and all participating employees are required by state statute to contribute fixed percentages of employees' gross earnings to the pension plans. Current contribution rates for the plan are as follows:

The School's contributions for the years ended June 30, 2019 and 2018 were \$353,484 and \$342,528, respectively.

7. Commitments and Contingencies

The School receives grants for specific purposes that are subject to audit by the grantor agencies. Such audits could lead to requests for reimbursement to the grantor agency for expenditures disallowed under terms of the grant. It is the opinion of the School's management that its compliance with the terms of the grant will not result in any disallowed costs.

The School has received funds from the United States Department of Agriculture for the purposes of the purchase of newly constructed school facilities. This loan is subject to audit or review for certain compliance and other requirements as outlined in the Uniform Guidance and the terms of the loan. Such audit or review could lead to reimbursement of funds or cancellation of the loan based on the number and severity of any noncompliance findings. It is the opinion of management that it is operating in compliance with the terms of the requirements as outlined in the Uniform Guidance and the terms of the loan and that any disallowed costs or noncompliance findings will be negligible, if any. As such, no provision has been recorded in the accompanying financial statements for any such contingencies.

8. Net Assets with Donor Restrictions

For the school years ended June 30, 2019 and 2018, the school received grants of \$50,000 and \$80,000, respectively, from the Pennington Foundation with the restriction that the funds be used for the School's permanent facility, wireless projector connectivity, and outdoor fields. During the years ended June 30, 2019 and 2018, the School spent \$368,915 and \$134,458, respectively, of the grants for its intended purpose leaving Net Assets with donor restrictions of \$0 at June 30, 2019, and \$318,915 at June 30, 2018.

9. USDA Loan

In FY18, the School paid their construction loan with funds from the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) through the Rural Development program. This program is designed to help improve the economy and quality of life in rural America. Under this program, USDA promotes economic development by supporting loans to businesses through banks, credit unions and community-managed lending pools.

The total available funds under this Program were \$7,797,000 with the full amount having been advanced as of June 30, 2019. Interest on the loan began to accrue on the origination date of October 5, 2017 and continued to accrue until paid in one lump sum interest payment on October 9, 2018. Regular loan payments of principal and interest began on November 28, 2018. This loan is scheduled to be repaid over a period of 40 years at an interest rate of 3.50%. 10. Liquidity and Availability of Financial Assets

The School has \$1,698,130 of financial assets available within one year of the statement of financial position date to meet cash needs for general and operating expenditures, consisting of cash of \$1,243,658 and accounts receivable of \$454,472. There are no amounts unavailable for general use due to contractual or donor imposed restrictions within one year of the statement of financial position date.

As part of the School's liquidity management, cash is kept in various checking accounts that can be accessed to meet daily needs of the School.

11. Prior Period Adjustment

Two errors resulting in the misstatement of financial statement categories as presented below in the June 30, 2018 financial statements were identified during the current year. The first error was related to an overstatement of revenues and accounts receivable due to the omission of an administrative fee which caused MFP funding receivable to be overstated. The second was due to the School improperly recording a liability for amounts that did not represent an obligation for future payment. The effects of the restatement on the financial statements as of and for the year ended June 30, 2018 are summarized below:

The Organization's management is responsible for those C/C areas identified in the SAUPs.

This agreed-upon procedures engagement was conducted in accordance with attestation standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and applicable standards of *Government Auditing Standards*. The sufficiency of these procedures is solely the responsibility of the specified users of this report. Consequently, we make no representation regarding the sufficiency of the procedures described below either for the purpose for which this report has been requested or for any other purpose.

The procedures and associated findings are as follows:

Written Policies and Procedures

1. Obtain the entity's written policies and procedures and report whether those written policies and procedures address each of the following financial/business functions (or report that the entity does not have any written policies and procedures):
 - a) **Budgeting**, including preparing, adopting, monitoring, and amending the budget
 - b) **Purchasing**, including (1) how purchases are initiated; (2) how vendors are added to the vendor list; (3) the preparation and approval process of purchase requisitions and purchase orders; (4) controls to ensure compliance with the public bid law; and (5) documentation required to be maintained for all bids and price quotes.
 - c) **Disbursements**, including processing, reviewing, and approving
 - d) **Receipts**, including receiving, recording, and preparing deposits
 - e) **Payroll/Personnel**, including (1) payroll processing, and (2) reviewing and approving time and records, including leave and overtime worked.

 - i) **Ethics**, including (1) the prohibitions as defined in Louisiana Revised Statute 42:1111-1121, (2) actions to be taken if an ethics violation takes place, (3) system to monitor possible ethics

violations, and (4) requirement that all employees, including elected officials, annually attest through signature verification that they have read the entity's ethics policy. Note: Ethics requirements are not applicable to nonprofits.

- j) **Debt Service**, including (1) debt issuance approval, (2) EMMA reporting requirements, (3) debt reserve requirements, and (4) debt service requirements. Note: Debt service requirements are not applicable to nonprofits.

 - a) Observe that the board/finance committee met with a quorum at least monthly, or on a frequency in accordance with the board's enabling legislation, charter, bylaws, or other equivalent document.
 - b) For those entities reporting on the governmental accounting model, observe that the minutes referenced or included monthly budget-to-actual comparisons on the general fund and major special revenue funds, as well as monthly financial statements (or budget-to-actual comparisons, if budgeted) for major proprietary funds. *Alternately, for those entities reporting on the non-profit accounting model, observe that the minutes referenced or included financial activity relating to public funds if those public funds comprised more than 10% of the entity's collections during the fiscal period.*
 - c) For governmental entities, obtain the prior year audit report and observe the unrestricted fund balance in the general fund. If the general fund had a negative ending unrestricted fund balance in the prior year audit report, observe that the minutes for at least one meeting during the fiscal period referenced or included a formal plan to eliminate the negative unrestricted fund balance in the general fund.

Bank Reconciliations

Note: In the prior year, no exceptions were noted as a result of applying these procedures. Therefore, we are not required to test these procedures in the current year.

3. Obtain a listing of client bank accounts for the fiscal period from management and management's representation that the listing is complete. Ask management to identify the entity's main operating account. Select the entity's main operating account and randomly select 4 additional accounts (or all accounts if less than 5). Randomly select one month from

the fiscal period, obtain and inspect the corresponding bank statement and reconciliation for selected each account, and observe that:

- a) Bank reconciliations include evidence that they were prepared within 2 months of the related statement closing date (e.g., initialed and dated, electronically logged);
- b) Bank reconciliations include evidence that a member of management/board member who does not handle cash, post ledgers, or issue checks has reviewed each bank reconciliation (e.g., initialed and dated, electronically logged); and
- c) Management has documentation reflecting that it has researched reconciling items that have been outstanding for more than 12 months from the statement closing date, if applicable.

Collections

Note: In the prior year, no exceptions were noted as a result of applying these procedures. Therefore, we are not required to test these procedures in the current year.

4. Obtain a listing of deposit sites for the fiscal period where deposits for cash/checks/money orders (cash) are prepared and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select 5 deposit sites (or all deposit sites if less than 5).
5. For each deposit site selected, obtain a listing of collection locations and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select one collection location for each deposit site (i.e. 5 collection locations for 5 deposit sites), obtain and inspect written policies and procedures relating to employee job duties (if no written policies or procedures, inquire of employees about their job duties) at each collection location, and observe that job duties are properly segregated at each collection location such that:
 - a) Employees that are responsible for cash collections do not share cash drawers/registers.
 - b) Each employee responsible for collecting cash is not responsible for preparing/making bank deposits, unless another employee/official is responsible for reconciling collection documentation (e.g. pre-numbered receipts) to the deposit.
 - c) Each employee responsible for collecting cash is not responsible for posting collection entries to the general ledger or subsidiary ledgers, unless another employee/official is responsible for reconciling ledger postings to each other and to the deposit.
 - d) The employee(s) responsible for reconciling cash collections to the general ledger and/or subsidiary ledgers, by revenue source and/or agency fund additions are not responsible for collecting cash, unless another employee verifies the reconciliation.
6. Inquire of management that all employees who have access to cash are covered by a bond or insurance policy for theft.
7. Randomly select two deposit dates for each of the 5 bank accounts selected for procedure #3 under "Bank Reconciliations" above (select the next deposit date chronologically if no deposits were made on the dates randomly selected and randomly select a deposit if multiple deposits are made on the same day). *Alternately, the practitioner may use a source document other than bank statements when selecting the deposit dates for testing, such as a cash*

collection log, daily revenue report, receipt book, etc. Obtain supporting documentation for each of the 10 deposits and:

- a) Observe that receipts are sequentially pre-numbered.
- b) Trace sequentially pre-numbered receipts, system reports, and other related collection documentation to the deposit slip.
- c) Trace the deposit slip total to the actual deposit per the bank statement.
- d) Observe that the deposit was made within one business day of receipt at the collection location (within one week if the depository is more than 10 miles from the collection location or the deposit is less than \$100).
- e) Trace the actual deposit per the bank statement to the general ledger.

Non-Payroll Disbursements (excluding card purchases/payments, travel reimbursements, and petty cash purchases)

Note: In the prior year, no exceptions were noted as a result of applying these procedures. Therefore, we are not required to test these procedures in the current year.

8. Obtain a listing of locations that process payments for the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select 5 locations (or all locations if less than 5).
9. For each location selected under #8 above, obtain a listing of those employees involved with non-payroll purchasing and payment functions. Obtain written policies and procedures relating to employee job duties (if the agency has no written policies and procedures, inquire of employees about their job duties), and observe that job duties are properly segregated such that:
 - a) At least two employees are involved in initiating a purchase request, approving a purchase, and placing an order/making the purchase.
 - b) At least two employees are involved in processing and approving payments to vendors.
 - c) The employee responsible for processing payments is prohibited from adding/modifying vendor files, unless another employee is responsible for periodically reviewing changes to vendor files.
 - d) Either the employee/official responsible for signing checks mails the payment or gives the signed checks to an employee to mail who is not responsible for processing payments.
10. For each location selected under #8 above, obtain the entity's non-payroll disbursement transaction population (excluding cards and travel reimbursements) and obtain management's representation that the population is complete. Randomly select 5 disbursements for each location, obtain supporting documentation for each transaction and:
 - a) Observe that the disbursement matched the related original invoice/billing statement.
 - b) Observe that the disbursement documentation included evidence (e.g., initial/date, electronic logging) of segregation of duties tested under #9, as applicable.

Credit Cards/Debit Cards/Fuel Cards/P-Cards

Note: In the prior year, no exceptions were noted as a result of applying these procedures. Therefore, we are not required to test these procedures in the current year.

11. Obtain from management a listing of all active credit cards, bank debit cards, fuel cards, and P-cards (cards) for the fiscal period, including the card numbers and the names of the persons who maintained possession of the cards. Obtain management's representation that the listing is complete.
12. Using the listing prepared by management, randomly select 5 cards (or all cards if less than 5) that were used during the fiscal period. Randomly select one monthly statement or combined statement for each card (for a debit card, randomly select one monthly bank statement), obtain supporting documentation, and:
 - a) Observe that there is evidence that the monthly statement or combined statement and supporting documentation (e.g., original receipts for credit/debit card purchases, exception reports for excessive fuel card usage) was reviewed and approved, in writing, by someone other than the authorized card holder. [Note: Requiring such approval may constrain the legal authority of certain public officials (e.g., mayor of a Lawrason Act municipality); these instances should not be reported.)]
 - c) Observe that finance charges and late fees were not assessed on the selected statements.
13. Using the monthly statements or combined statements selected under #12 above, excluding fuel cards, randomly select 10 transactions (or all transactions if less than 10) from each statement, and obtain supporting documentation for the transactions (i.e. each card should have 10 transactions subject to testing). For each transaction, observe that it is supported by (1) an original itemized receipt that identifies precisely what was purchased, (2) written documentation of the business/public purpose, and (3) documentation of the individuals participating in meals (for meal charges only).

Travel and Travel-Related Expense Reimbursements (excluding card transactions)

Note: In the prior year, no exceptions were noted as a result of applying these procedures. Therefore, we are not required to test these procedures in the current year.

14. Obtain from management a listing of all travel and travel-related expense reimbursements during the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing or general ledger is complete. Randomly select 5 reimbursements, obtain the related expense reimbursement forms/prepaid expense documentation of each selected reimbursement, as well as the supporting documentation. For each of the 5 reimbursements selected:
 - a) If reimbursed using a per diem, agree the reimbursement rate to those rates established either by the State of Louisiana or the U.S. General Services Administration (www.gsa.gov).

- b) If reimbursed using actual costs, observe that the reimbursement is supported by an original itemized receipt that identifies precisely what was purchased.
- c) Observe that each reimbursement is supported by documentation of the business/public purpose (for meal charges, observe that the documentation includes the names of those individuals participating) and other documentation required by written policy (procedure #1h).
- d) Observe that each reimbursement was reviewed and approved, in writing, by someone other than the person receiving reimbursement.

Contracts

Note: In the prior year, no exceptions were noted as a result of applying these procedures. Therefore, we are not required to test these procedures in the current year.

15. Obtain from management a listing of all agreements/contracts for professional services, materials and supplies, leases, and construction activities that were initiated or renewed during the fiscal period. *Alternately, the practitioner may use an equivalent selection source, such as an active vendor list.* Obtain management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select 5 contracts (or all contracts if less than 5) from the listing, excluding the practitioner's contract, and:
- a) Observe that the contract was bid in accordance with the Louisiana Public Bid Law (e.g., solicited quotes or bids, advertised), if required by law.
 - b) Observe that the contract was approved by the governing body/board, if required by policy or law (e.g. Lawrason Act, Home Rule Charter).
 - c) If the contract was amended (e.g. change order), observe that the original contract terms provided for such an amendment.
 - d) Randomly select one payment from the fiscal period for each of the 5 contracts, obtain the supporting invoice, agree the invoice to the contract terms, and observe that the invoice and related payment agreed to the terms and conditions of the contract.

Payroll and Personnel

Note: In the prior year, no exceptions were noted as a result of applying these procedures. Therefore, we are not required to test these procedures in the current year.

16. Obtain a listing of employees/elected officials employed during the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select 5 employees/officials, obtain related paid salaries and personnel files, and agree paid salaries to authorized salaries/pay rates in the personnel files.
17. Randomly select one pay period during the fiscal period. For the 5 employees/officials selected under #16 above, obtain attendance records and leave documentation for the pay period, and:

- a) Observe that all selected employees/officials documented their daily attendance and leave (e.g., vacation, sick, compensatory). (Note: Generally, an elected official is not eligible to earn leave and does not document his/her attendance and leave. However, if the elected official is earning leave according to policy and/or contract, the official should document his/her daily attendance and leave.)
 - b) Observe that supervisors approved the attendance and leave of the selected employees/officials.
 - c) Observe that any leave accrued or taken during the pay period is reflected in the entity's cumulative leave records.
18. Obtain a listing of those employees/officials that received termination payments during the fiscal period and management's representation that the list is complete. Randomly select two employees/officials, obtain related documentation of the hours and pay rates used in management's termination payment calculations, agree the hours to the employee/officials' cumulative leave records, and agree the pay rates to the employee/officials' authorized pay rates in the employee/officials' personnel files.
19. Obtain management's representation that employer and employee portions of payroll taxes, retirement contributions, health insurance premiums, and workers' compensation premiums have been paid, and associated forms have been filed, by required deadlines.

Ethics

20. Using the 5 randomly selected employees/officials from procedure #16 under "Payroll and Personnel" above, obtain ethics documentation from management, and:
- a. Observe that the documentation demonstrates each employee/official completed one hour of ethics training during the fiscal period.
Exception: It was noted that there was no requirement for employees to complete one hour of ethics training for the school year ended June 30, 2019.
 - b. Observe that the documentation demonstrates each employee/official attested through signature verification that he or she has read the entity's ethics policy during the fiscal period.
Exception: It was noted that for the 2018-2019 school year, the School did not have a procedure in place requiring employees to attest via signature that they read the School's ethics policy.

Debt Service

21. Obtain a listing of bonds/notes issued during the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing is complete. Select all bonds/notes on the listing, obtain supporting documentation, and observe that State Bond Commission approval was obtained for each bond/note issued.

Results: The School is a non-profit therefore this procedure is not applicable.

22. Obtain a listing of bonds/notes outstanding at the end of the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select one bond/note, inspect debt covenants, obtain supporting documentation for the reserve balance and payments, and agree actual reserve balances and payments to those required by debt covenants.

Results: The School is a non-profit therefore this procedure is not applicable.

Other

Note: In the prior year, no exceptions were noted as a result of applying these procedures. Therefore, we are not required to test these procedures in the current year.

23. Obtain a listing of misappropriations of public funds and assets during the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing is complete. Select all misappropriations on the listing, obtain supporting documentation, and observe that the entity reported the misappropriation(s) to the legislative auditor and the district attorney of the parish in which the entity is domiciled.
24. Observe that the entity has posted on its premises and website, the notice required by R.S. 24:523.1 concerning the reporting of misappropriation, fraud, waste, or abuse of public funds

Management's Response: We have reviewed the independent accountant's report on applying agreed-upon procedures and agree with the exceptions noted. As noted above, we gave updated our policies and procedures accordingly to include the best practices suggested by the Louisiana Legislative Auditor.

This agreed-upon procedures engagement was performed in accordance with attestation standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, and the standards applicable to attestation engagement contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the United States Comptroller General. We were not engaged to and did not conduct an examination or review, the objective of which would be the expression of an opinion or conclusion, respectively, on those C/C areas identified in the SAUPs. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion or conclusion. Had we performed additional procedures, other matters might have come to our attention that would have been reported to you.

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of testing performed on those C/C areas identified in the SAUPs, and the result of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on control or compliance. Accordingly, this report is not suitable for any other purpose. Under Louisiana Revised Statute 24:513, this report is distributed by the LLA as a public document.
