Independent Auditors' Report

To the Board of Directors North Louisiana Economic Partnership, Inc.

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of North Louisiana Economic Partnership, Inc. (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statements of financial position as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of North Louisiana Economic Partnership, Inc. (a nonprofit organization) as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS) and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States (*Government Auditing Standards*). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of North Louisiana Economic Partnership, Inc. and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about North Louisiana Economic Partnership, Inc.'s ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS and Government Auditing Standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud
 or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include
 examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that
 are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion of the
 effectiveness of North Louisiana Economic Partnership, Inc.'s internal control. Accordingly, no such
 opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that
 raise substantial doubt about North Louisiana Economic Partnership, Inc.'s ability to continue as a going
 concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audit.

Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements as a whole. The accompanying schedule of compensation, benefits, and other payments to agency head on page 17, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated June 27, 2025, on our consideration of the North Louisiana Economic Partnership, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of North Louisiana Economic Partnership, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. (1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

A. Nature of Activities

The North Louisiana Economic Partnership, Inc. (NLEP) is a nonprofit organization incorporated under the laws of the State of Louisiana and is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)3 of the Internal Revenue Code. The purpose of the North Louisiana Economic Partnership, Inc. is to assist local government by studying problems such as public education, crime prevention, poverty, and economic development and publicize the results of its research and recommendations, and to work for the general betterment of the North Louisiana area.

B. Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the North Louisiana Economic Partnership, Inc. have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

C. Use of Estimates

Management uses estimates and assumptions in preparing financial statements. Those estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities, and reported revenues and expenses. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

D. Basis of Presentation

The financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards. Under those standards, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets:

Net assets without donor restrictions: Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed restrictions and may be expended for any purpose in performing the primary objective of the organization. These net assets may be used at the discretion of NLEP's management and the board of directors.

Net assets with donor restrictions: Net assets subject to stipulations imposed by donors and grantors. Some donor restrictions are temporary in nature; those restrictions will be met by actions of NLEP or by the passage of time. Other donor restrictions are perpetual in nature, whereby the donor has stipulated the funds be maintained in perpetuity.

Donor restricted contributions are reported as increases in net assets with donor restrictions. When a restriction expires, net assets are reclassified from net assets with donor restrictions to net assets without donor restrictions in the statement of activities. NLEP has adopted a policy to classify donor restricted contributions as without donor restriction to the extent that donor restrictions are met in the year the contribution was received.

E. Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, NLEP considers all unrestricted highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

F. Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are stated at the amount management expects to collect, based on balances that NLEP has an unconditional right to receive less management's estimate of amounts that may not be collectible.

No allowance for credit losses have been provided since management has determined that the expected credit loss is not material at the balance sheet date.

G. Promises to Give

Unconditional promises to give are recognized as revenues or gains in the period the promise to give is received and as assets, decreases of liabilities, or expenses depending on the form of the benefits received. Management provides for probable uncollectible amounts through establishment of an allowance, based on its assessment of recent collection history and current donor relationships. Initial amounts recognized represent the fair value expected to be collected. Conditional promises to give are recognized when the conditions on which they depend are substantially met.

H. Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are carried at cost or, if donated, at the approximate fair value at the date of donation. Depreciation is provided on the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets. NLEP has adopted a policy of capitalizing all assets with a unit value of \$2,500 or more.

I. Contributions

Contributions received are recorded as increase in net assets without donor restrictions or net assets with donor restrictions depending on the existence and/or nature or any donor restrictions. When restrictions expire (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions. In the absence of donor restrictions to the contrary, restrictions on contributions of property or equipment or on assets restricted to acquiring property or equipment expire when the property or equipment is placed in service.

J. Income Tax Status

The North Louisiana Economic Partnership, Inc. is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. However, income from certain activities not directly related to the Partnership's tax-exempt purpose is subject to taxation as unrelated business income. The Partnership had no such income during this audit period. The North Louisiana Economic Partnership, Inc.'s Forms 990, Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax, for the years ended 2021, 2022, 2023, and 2024 are subject to examination by the IRS, generally for three years after they were filed.

K. Advertising Costs

The NLEP uses advertising to promote its services among the community it serves. The costs of advertising are expensed as incurred. During 2024 and 2023, advertising costs totaled \$37,959 and \$80,938, respectively.

L. Functional Expenses

The costs of providing certain activities of NLEP have been summarized on a functional basis in the statements of activities and in the statements of functional expense. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among programs and supported services benefited. Costs are directly charged to the functions they benefit. Facility related and supportive services expenses are allocated to each function based upon management's equitable determination.

M. Prepaid expenses

Prepaid expenses as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, is comprised primarily of annual licensing agreements and certain expenses for a 2025 event which were paid in advance.

(2) Concentrations of Credit Risk

Financial instruments that potentially subject NLEP to concentrations of credit risk consist principally of temporary cash investments, accounts receivable, grant receivables, and promises to give. Concentrations of credit risk with respect to grant receivables are limited due to these amounts being due from governmental agencies under contractual terms. Concentrations of credit risk with respect to accounts receivable and promises to give are limited due to the large number of contributors comprising the North Louisiana Economic Partnership, Inc.'s contributor base and their dispersion across different industries. Concentrations of credit risk with respect to promises to give include approximately twenty percent (20%) due from one contributor.

NLEP maintains cash balances at financial institutions located in the Shreveport area. Accounts at the institutions are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) up to certain amounts. At December 31, 2024, total cash balances held at financial institutions was \$1,300,388, of which \$1,228,663 was secured by FDIC, and the remaining \$71,726, was unsecured. At December 31, 2023, total cash balances held at financial institutions was \$824,840, of which \$781,090 was secured by FDIC, and the remaining \$43,750, was unsecured.

(3) Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable of \$5,676 and \$9,311 at December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively, is comprised of riverboat boarding fees and other miscellaneous amounts due to the North Louisiana Economic Partnership, Inc. as of the end of the year but not received until after those dates.

(4) Grant Receivables

Various funding sources provide reimbursement of allowable costs under contracts or agreements. These balances represent amounts due from the funding sources at December 31, 2024 and 2023 but not received until after those dates.

(5) Employee Benefit Plans

NLEP participates in a 401(k) profit sharing plan whereby NLEP makes contributions to the Plan each year up to 8% of participating employee's compensation. Total expenses for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023 were approximately \$64,924 and \$77,384, respectively.

(6) Deposit Held in Escrow

During 2024, NLEP made a deposit of \$125,000 related to the anticipated purchase of a building with an estimated total purchase price of up to \$7,500,000. The closing date is expected to be in September 2025. The deposit is recorded as a non-current asset Deposit Held in Escrow in the Statement of Financial Position. Upon completion of the transaction, the deposit will be reclassified as a part of the capitalized cost of the building.

(7) Promises to Give

The North Louisiana Economic Partnership, Inc. initiated a campaign during 2021 entitled "2022 – 2026 Capital Campaign." Promises to give are restricted to payment of costs associated with economic development projects and projects supporting the economic growth of north Louisiana. The promises to give are discounted at .06%, and are shown net of an allowance for uncollectible promises to give of \$129,700 at December 31, 2024 and \$87,750 at December 31, 2023.

(9) Contractual Revenue - Grants

During the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, North Louisiana Economic Partnership, Inc. received contractual revenue from federal, state and local grants in the amount of \$538,420 and \$507,713, respectively. The continued existence of these funds is based on annual contract renewals with various funding sources.

(11) Endowment Account with Community Foundation of North Louisiana

The NLEP entered into an agreement with the Community Foundation of North Louisiana (CFNL). The agreement establishes an Agency Endowment Fund at CFNL called "Northwest Louisiana Economic Development Foundation Fund" (Fund). All property of the Fund belongs to CFNL. The fund will be used for support of the charitable purposes of the Partnership. Net income and capital appreciation of the Fund, as governed by CFNL's Spending Policy, will be paid and distributed to the Partnership at least annually, for as long as the Partnership is a Qualified Charitable Organization.

There were no transfers made to the fund during the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023. The fair market value of the fund at December 31, 2024 and 2023, was \$336,898 and \$319,230, respectively.

(12) Right-of-Use Operating Leases

The NLEP leases certain office space under long-term, non-cancellable operating leases. The risk-free discount rate with a period comparable with that of the individual lease term was used which is 4.57%.

(15) Concentration

For the year ended December 31, 2024, NLEP received approximately \$1,024,233, or 52% of its total contributions of financial assets, from two donors. NLEP recognizes this concentration and considers it as part of its overall financial management.

(16) Commitment

In November 2024, NLEP entered into a purchase agreement to acquire a building with a purchase price of up to \$7,500,000, with an expected closing date by September 2025. The purchase is contingent upon funding of approximately \$6,500,000 in funds from the State of Louisiana and \$1,050,405 from the Northwest Louisiana Finance Authority.

In 2025, NLEP incurred expenses totaling approximately \$232,416 in relation to this project for site investigation work.

North Louisiana Economic Partnership, Inc. has agreed to and acknowledged that the procedures performed are appropriate to meet the intended purpose of the engagement, which is to perform specified procedures on the C/C areas identified in LLA's SAUPs for the fiscal period January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2024. Additionally, LLA has agreed to and acknowledged that the procedures performed are appropriate for its purposes. This report may not be suitable for any other purpose. The procedures performed may not address all the items of interest to a user of this report and may not meet the needs of all users of this report and, as such, users are responsible for determining whether the procedures performed are appropriate for their purposes.

The procedures and associated findings are as follows:

1) Written Policies and Procedures

Testing not required for this area for the fiscal period January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2024, due to no exceptions being noted in prior year.

2) Board or Finance Committee

Testing not required for this area for the fiscal period January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2024, due to no exceptions being noted in prior year.

3) Bank Reconciliations

Testing not required for this area for the fiscal period January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2024, due to no exceptions being noted in prior year.

4) Collections (excluding electronic funds transfers)

Testing not required for this area for the fiscal period January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2024, due to no exceptions being noted in prior year.

- Non-Payroll Disbursements (excluding card purchases/payments, travel reimbursements, and petty cash purchases)
- A. Obtain a listing of locations that process payments for the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select 5 locations (or all locations if less than 5).
- B. For each location selected under procedure #5A above, obtain a listing of those employees involved with non-payroll purchasing and payment functions. Obtain written policies and procedures relating to employee job duties (if the agency has no written policies and procedures, then inquire of employees about their job duties), and observe that job duties are properly segregated such that
 - At least two employees are involved in initiating a purchase request, approving a purchase, and placing an order or making the purchase;
 - ii. At least two employees are involved in processing and approving payments to vendors;
 - iii. The employee responsible for processing payments is prohibited from adding/modifying vendor files, unless another employee is responsible for periodically reviewing changes to vendor files;
 - iv. Either the employee/official responsible for signing checks mails the payment or gives the signed checks to an employee to mail who is not responsible for processing payments; and
 - v. Only employees/officials authorized to sign checks approve the electronic disbursement (release) of funds, whether through automated clearinghouse (ACH), electronic funds transfer (EFT), wire transfer, or some other electronic means.
- C. For each location selected under procedure #5A above, obtain the entity's non-payroll disbursement transaction population (excluding cards and travel reimbursements) and obtain management's representation that the population is complete. Randomly select 5 disbursements for each location, obtain supporting documentation for each transaction, and
 - Observe whether the disbursement, whether by paper or electronic means, matched the related original itemized invoice and supporting documentation indicates that deliverables included on the invoice were received by the entity, and
 - Observe whether the disbursement documentation included evidence (e.g., initial/date, electronic logging) of segregation of duties tested under procedure #5B above, as applicable.
- D. Using the entity's main operating account and the month selected in Bank Reconciliations procedure #3A, randomly select 5 non-payroll-related electronic disbursements (or all electronic disbursements if less than 5) and observe that each electronic disbursement was (a) approved by only those persons authorized to disburse funds (e.g., sign checks) per the entity's policy, and (b) approved by the required number of authorized signers per the entity's policy.
