Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Fremaux Economic Development District, Slidell, Louisiana (the "District") (a component unit of the City of Slidell), as of and for the year ended June 30, 2017, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Fremaux Economic Development District as of June 30, 2017, and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis and budgetary comparison information on pages 3 through 6 and 24 through 25 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements. The supporting schedule on page 26 is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The supporting schedule is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the supporting schedule is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated December 19, 2017, on our consideration of the District's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the District's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

JUNE 30, 2017

Our discussion and analysis of the Fremaux Economic Development District's (the "District") financial performance provides an overview of the District's financial activities for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017. This analysis should be read in conjunction with the audited financial statements, which follow this section.

USING THIS ANNUAL REPORT

This annual report consists of a series of financial statements. The Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities (on pages 7 and 8) provide information about the activities of the District as a whole and present a long-term view of the District's finances.

Fund financial statements start on page 9. For governmental activities, these statements report how these services were financed in the short-term as well as what remains for future spending. Fund financial statements also report the District's operations in more detail than the government-wide statements by providing information about the District's most significant funds.

The Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities

Our analysis of the District as a whole begins on page 7. The Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities report information about the District as a whole and about its activities. These statements include all assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities, and deferred inflows of resources using the accrual basis of accounting, which is similar to the accounting used by most private-sector companies. As such, all of the current year's revenues and expenses are taken into account regardless of when cash is received or paid.

These two statements report the District's net position and changes in them. Over time, increases or decreases in the District's net position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the District as a whole is improving or deteriorating.

In both of the government-wide financial statements, all of the District's basic services are reported as governmental activities and will be financed primarily through revenues from sales and hotel occupancy taxes.

Fund Financial Statements

The fund financial statements begin on page 9 and provide detailed information about the most significant funds—not the District as a whole. The District's basic services are reported in governmental funds, which focus on how money flows into and out of those funds and the balances left at year-end that are available for spending. These funds are reported using an accounting method called modified accrual accounting, which measures cash and all other financial assets that can readily be converted to cash. The governmental fund statements provide a detailed short-term view of the District's general government operations and the basic services it provides. Governmental fund information helps you determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent in the near future to finance the District's programs.

Notes to the Financial Statements

The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements. The notes to the financial statements can be found beginning on page 13 of this report.

Other Information

In addition to the basic financial statements and accompanying notes, this report also presents certain *required supplementary information* concerning budgetary basis reporting for the General Fund and Debt Service Fund. Required supplementary information can be found on pages 24 and 25 of this report.

Government-Wide Financial Analysis

As noted earlier, net position (deficit) may serve over time as a useful indicator of a government's financial position. In the case of the District, liabilities exceeded assets by \$8,301,161 at the close of fiscal year 2017 and \$8,336,019 at the close of fiscal year 2016.

The District's total assets decreased by \$11,864. The District's total liabilities decreased by \$46,722.

The District's net position increased \$34,858 during the current fiscal year.

As of June 30, 2017, the District has a government-wide net deficit. The District has \$1,102,344 (13%) of net position restricted for debt service and the remaining net deficit is unrestricted. At the end of the current fiscal year, the District is not able to report positive balances in net position for governmental activities. This is due to the issuance of Sales Tax Bonds during 2014 and 2016.

Governmental activities increased the District's net position by \$34,858.

Total revenue related to governmental activities increased by \$41,823 (7%) in 2017 as compared to 2016, largely due to an increase in the collection of sales and use tax.

Total expenses for governmental activities decreased by \$3,473,335 (86%) in 2017 compared to 2016. The District incurred expenses during 2017 for interest on long-term debt. In 2016, District expenses included \$3,235,751 related to reimbursement of developer costs.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE GOVERNMENT'S FUNDS

The District uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. The focus of the District's governmental funds is to provide information on near-term inflows, outflows, and balances of spendable resources. Such information is useful in assessing the District's financing requirements. In particular, unreserved fund balance may serve as a useful measure of a government's net resources available for spending at the end of the fiscal year.

As of the end of the current fiscal year, the District's governmental funds reported combined ending fund balances of \$2,442,963, a decrease of \$8,844 in comparison with the prior year fund balance of \$2,451,807.

Fund balance in the General Fund and Debt Service Fund decreased by \$1,660 and \$7,184, respectively, during the current fiscal year.

DEBT

At year-end, the District had \$10,650,249 in long-term debt which consisted of sales tax bonds. Long-term debt increased slightly from the prior year due to the net effect of the amortization of original issue discounts. More detailed information about this issuance is disclosed in Note 4 to the financial statements.

OTHER FACTORS AFFECTING THE DISTRICT

The District's management approach is fiscally conservative. This District issued bonds to finance various capital improvements within the District. The District will meet future obligations to redeem bonds with the proceeds of sales taxes collected within the District which is pledged for the repayment of the bonds.

ECONOMIC FACTORS AND NEXT YEAR'S BUDGET

The District's elected and appointed officials considered the following factors when setting the 2018 budget:

In 2018, sales tax revenue in the District is expected to approximate 2017 sales tax revenue due to the near completion of the Phase 2 retail development plan.

The sales tax collections net of expenses for collections, the trustee, auditing and accounting are dedicated to debt service on the outstanding bonds.

When the District sold the 2015 series of bonds, a portion of the proceeds were deposited in escrow to be released to the developer in November 2017 if it satisfied certain conditions (most of which dealt with the amount of leased space and the average sales per square foot of those tenants). Accordingly, \$1,100,000 was budgeted for developer reimbursement in the 2018 budget. The conditions for release of funds to the developer were not satisfied. As a result, \$1,210,000 (consisting of \$1,100,000 from the Escrow Fund and \$110,000 from the Reserve Fund) were transferred to the Extraordinary Redemption Fund and used to redeem a portion of the Series 2015 Bonds on November 1, 2017. The 2018 budget will be amended to reflect this change.

(1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Reporting Entity

The Fremaux Economic Development District (the "District") is an economic development district and a political subdivision of the State of Louisiana, created pursuant to Part II of Chapter 27 of Title 33 and ordinance No. 3460 adopted by the Slidell City Council in its capacity as the governing authority of the City of Slidell, State of Louisiana on March 25, 2008. Pursuant to the Louisiana Cooperative Economic Development Law, the Slidell City Council acts as the governing authority of both the City and the District; however the two entities are separate and distinct political subdivisions of the State.

The District encompasses 89 acres of land where a mixed use development is being constructed in multiple phases. The purpose of the District is to issue sales tax and hotel occupancy increment revenue bonds for economic development in the District. The City of Slidell is the financial reporting entity for the District. The City of Slidell appoints the District's governing body and can impose its will on the District. Accordingly, the District has been determined to be a discretely presented component unit of the City of Slidell. The accompanying financial statements present information only on the activities and funds maintained by the District and do not present information on the City of Slidell. As a discrete component unit, the accompanying financial statements are included within the reporting of the primary government.

Basis of Presentation

The financial statements of the Fremaux Economic Development District, State of Louisiana have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles.

This financial report has been prepared in conformity with GASB Statement No. 34, *Basic Financial Statements and Management's Discussion and Analysis for State and Local Governments*, issued in June 1999, as amended by GASB Statement No. 63, *Financial Reporting of Deferred Outflows of Resources, Deferred Inflows of Resources, and Net Position*.

Government-Wide and Fund Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements (i.e., the Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Changes in Net Position) report information on all of the nonfiduciary activities of the District. The effect of interfund activity has been removed from these statements.

The Statement of Activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function or segment are offset by program revenues. Direct expenses are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. Program revenues include 1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function or segment and 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment. Taxes and other items not properly included among program revenues are reported instead as general revenues.

(1) **SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)**

Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Property taxes are recognized as revenues in the year for which they are levied.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be available when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the District considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the current fiscal period. Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. However, debt service expenditures are recorded only when payment is due.

Property taxes and interest associated with the current fiscal period are all considered to be susceptible to accrual and so have been recognized as revenues of the current fiscal period. All other revenue items are considered to be measurable and available only when cash is received by the government.

The District reports the following major governmental funds:

The ***General Fund*** is the District's primary operating fund. It accounts for all financial resources of the general government, except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

The ***Debt Service Fund*** accounts for the accumulation of resources for the payment of general long-term debt principal.

Amounts reported as program revenues include 1) charges to customers or applicants for goods, services, or privileges provided, 2) operating grants and contributions, and 3) capital grants and contributions. Internally dedicated resources are reported as general revenues rather than as program revenues. Likewise, general revenues include all taxes.

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the District's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as they are needed.

(1) **SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)**

Budgetary Accounting

Budgetary procedures applicable to the District are defined in state law, Louisiana Revised Statutes 39:1301-14. The major requirements of the Local Government Budget Act are summarized as follows:

The District must adopt a budget each year for the general fund and each special revenue fund, if applicable.

The District must prepare a proposed budget and submit it to the City Council for consideration no later than fifteen days prior to the beginning of each fiscal year. At the same time, if total proposed expenditures are \$500,000 or more, a notice of public hearing on the proposed budget must be published in the official journal.

All action necessary to adopt and implement the budget must be completed prior to the beginning of the fiscal year. A proposed hearing was held and the budget adopted prior to the beginning of the fiscal year.

Budgetary amendments involving the transfer of funds from one program or function to another or involving increases in expenditures resulting from revenues exceeding amounts estimated require the approval of the City Council.

The budgets are integrated into the accounting system, and the budgetary data, as presented in the financial statements for all funds with annual budgets, compare the expenditures with the amended budgets. All budgets are presented on the modified accrual basis of accounting.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For the purpose of the Statement of Net Position, cash includes demand deposits of the District. Cash equivalents include short-term, highly liquid, money market mutual funds invested in U.S. Treasury and agency obligations.

The District is authorized under state law to deposit funds within a fiscal agent bank organized under the laws of the State of Louisiana, the laws of any other state in the United States, or laws of the United States. Under state laws, these deposits must be secured by federal deposit insurance or the pledge of securities owned by the fiscal agent bank. State Law R.S. 39:1225 provides that the amount of the security shall at all times be equal to 100% of the amount on deposit to the credit of each depositing authority, except that portion of the deposits insured by United States.

Investments

State law allows the District to invest in collateralized certificates of deposits, government backed securities, commercial paper, the state sponsored investment pool, and mutual funds consisting solely of government backed securities.

Interfund Transactions

During the course of operations, numerous transactions occur between individual funds that may result in amounts owed between funds. The permanent reallocation of resources between funds of the District are classified as interfund transfers. For the purposes of the Statement of Activities, all interfund transfers between individual governmental funds have been eliminated. Interfund services provided and used are not eliminated in the process of consolidation.

Restricted Assets

Restricted assets on the Balance Sheet of the General Fund of \$1,240,414 represent the deposit of net revenues from the one-half percent sales tax collected by the District which are held in trust and disbursed by the trustee in accordance with terms of the bond indenture.

Restricted cash on the Balance Sheet of the Debt Service Fund of \$1,102,344 represents amounts which are required to be maintained pursuant to the ordinance relating to Sales Tax Bond Series 2014 and Sales Tax Bond Series 2015 to satisfy reserve requirements. A corresponding amount of fund balance is restricted as these monies are legally segregated for a specific future use.

Long-Term Debt

In the government-wide financial statements, long-term debt and other long-term obligations are reported as liabilities in the applicable governmental activities Statement of Net Position. Bond premiums and discounts are amortized over the life of the bonds using the effective interest method. Bonds payable are reported net of the applicable bond premium or discount. Bond issuance costs are reported as expenditures in the period incurred.

In the fund financial statements, governmental fund types recognize bond premiums and discounts, as well as bond issuance costs, during the current period. The face amount of debt issued is reported as other financing sources. Premiums received on debt issuances are reported as other financing sources while discounts on debt issuance are reported as other financing uses. Issuance costs, whether or not withheld from the actual debt proceeds received, are reported as debt service expenditures.

Equity Classifications

In the government-wide financial statements, equity is classified as net position and displayed in three components:

- a. Net investment in capital assets - consists of capital assets including restricted capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balances of any bonds, mortgages, notes, or other borrowings that are attributable to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets.

Equity Classifications (continued)

- b. Restricted net position - consists of net position with constraints placed on the use either by (1) external groups such as creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments; or (2) law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation. Restricted for other purposes on the Statement of Net Position consist of Debt Service.

- c. Unrestricted net position - all other net position that do not meet the definition of “restricted” or “net investment in capital assets”.

Governmental fund equity is classified as fund balance. Fund balance is further classified as non-spendable, restricted, committed, assigned, and unassigned. The Council, as the highest level of decision-making authority, can establish, modify or rescind a fund balance commitment by ordinance at a public Council meeting.

When both restricted and unrestricted fund balances are available for use, it is the District’s policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted as needed. When committed, assigned or unassigned fund balances are available for use, it is the District’s policy to use committed resources first, then assigned resources and unassigned resources as they are needed.

Minimum Unrestricted Fund Balance Policy

The District has not adopted a minimum unrestricted fund balance policy. The disbursement of revenue collected by the District and the resulting fund balance are governed by the bond indenture.

Accounting Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make certain estimates and assumptions. Those estimates affect the reported amounts of assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities, and deferred inflows of resources and disclosure of assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities and deferred inflows of resources at the date of the financial statements. They may also affect the reported amounts of revenues and expenses of proprietary funds and the government-wide financial statements during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through December 19, 2017, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Custodial credit risk is the risk that, in the event of a bank failure, the District's deposits might not be recovered. The District's deposit policy for custodial credit risk conforms to state law, as described in Note 1. At June 30, 2017, the District's demand deposit bank balances of \$6 were entirely secured by federal deposit insurance. The District's money market mutual funds were entirely secured by government backed securities held in the District's name.

(3) DEDICATED REVENUES

On March 25, 2008, the City Council passed ordinance number 3461 levying an additional sales tax of one percent (1%) in the District and passed ordinance number 3462 levying a hotel occupancy tax of one percent (1%) in the District to fund economic development projects selected by the District. On December 13, 2011, the City Council adopted ordinance number 3636 to reduce the levy from one percent (1%) to one-half of one percent (0.50%), dedicated to economic development in the District.

The Bonds were issued for the purpose of paying the costs of various capital improvements within the District and paying the costs of issuance of the Bonds. Most of the proceeds were used to pay or reimburse Slidell Development Company, L.L.C., the developer, for certain costs of economic development projects (consisting of water, sewer, drainage, roads and related infrastructure projects and other costs of a multi-purpose real estate development consisting of retail, commercial, residential, office, hotel, education and/or medical facilities) in or beneficial to the District.

(5) INTERFUND TRANSFERS

The General Fund transferred \$586,379 to the Debt Service Fund for principal and interest payments on the Revenue Bonds Series 2014 and interest payments on the Revenue Bonds Series 2015.

The GASB has issued Statement No. 74, “*Financial Reporting for Post-employment Benefit Plans Other Than Pension Plans.*” The requirements of this Statement will improve financial reporting primarily through enhanced note disclosures and schedules of required supplementary information that will be presented by OPEB plans that are administered through trusts that meet the specified criteria. This Statement is effective for financial statements for fiscal years beginning after June 15, 2016. This Statement did not have a material effect on the District’s financial statements upon implementation.

The GASB has issued Statement No. 75, “*Accounting and Financial Reporting by Employers for Postemployment Benefits Other Than Pensions.*” The requirements of this Statement will improve the decision-usefulness of information in employer and governmental nonemployer contributing entity financial reports and will enhance its value for assessing accountability and interperiod equity by requiring recognition of the entire OPEB liability and a more comprehensive measure of OPEB expense. This Statement is effective for fiscal years beginning after June 15, 2017. The District plans to adopt this Statement as applicable by the effective date.

The GASB has issued Statement No. 77, “*Tax Abatement Disclosures.*” The requirements of this Statement improve financial reporting by giving users of financial statements essential information that is not consistently or comprehensively reported to the public at present. Disclosure of information about the nature and magnitude of tax abatements will make these transactions more transparent to financial statement users. The requirements of this Statement are effective for financial statements for periods beginning after December 15, 2015. This Statement did not have a material effect on the District’s financial statements upon implementation.

The GASB has issued Statement No. 78, “*Pensions Provided through Certain Multiple-Employer Defined Benefit Pension Plans.*” This Statement amends the scope and applicability of Statement No. 68 to exclude pensions provided to employees of state or local governmental employers through a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan that (1) is not a state or local governmental pension plan, (2) is used to provide defined benefit pensions both to employees of state or local governmental employers and to employees of employers that are not state or local governmental employers, and (3) has no predominant state or local governmental employer (either individually or collectively with other state or local governmental employers that provide pensions through the pension plan). This Statement establishes requirements for recognition and measurement of pension expense, expenditures, and liabilities; note disclosures; and required supplementary information for pensions that have the characteristics described above. The requirements of this Statement are effective for reporting periods beginning after December 15, 2015. This Statement did not have a material effect on the District’s financial statements upon implementation.

Specifically, it establishes criteria for an external investment pool to qualify for making the election to measure all of its investments at amortized cost for financial reporting purposes. The requirements of this Statement are effective for reporting periods beginning after June 15, 2015, except for certain provisions on portfolio quality, custodial credit risk, and shadow pricing. Those provisions are effective for reporting periods beginning after December 15, 2015. This Statement did not have a material effect on the District's financial statements upon implementation.

The GASB has issued Statement No. 80, "*Blending Requirements for Certain Component Units an amendment of GASB Statement No. 14.*" The objective of this Statement is to improve financial reporting by clarifying the financial statement presentation requirements for certain component units. This Statement amends the blending requirements established in paragraph 53 of Statement No. 14, "The Financial Reporting Entity," as amended. The requirements of this Statement are effective for reporting periods beginning after June 15, 2016. This Statement did not have a material effect on the District's financial statements upon implementation.

The GASB has issued Statement No. 81, "*Irrevocable Split-Interest Agreements.*" The objective of this Statement is to improve accounting and financial reporting for irrevocable split-interest agreements by providing recognition and measurement guidance for situations in which a government is a beneficiary of the agreement. The requirements of this Statement are effective for financial statements for periods beginning after December 15, 2016. The District plans to adopt this Statement as applicable by the effective date.

The GASB has issued Statement No. 82, "*Pension Issues an amendment of GASB Statements No. 67, No. 68, and No. 73.*" The objective of this Statement is to address certain issues that have been raised with respect to Statements No. 67, "*Financial Reporting for Pension Plans,*" No. 68, "*Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions,*" and No. 73, "*Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions and Related Assets That Are Not within the Scope of GASB Statement 68, and Amendments to Certain Provisions of GASB Statements 67 and 68.*" Specifically, this Statement addresses issues regarding (1) the presentation of payroll-related measures in required supplementary information, (2) the selection of assumptions and the treatment of deviations from the guidance in an Actuarial Standard of Practice for financial reporting purposes, and (3) the classification of payments made by employers to satisfy employee (plan member) contribution requirements. The requirements of this Statement are effective for reporting periods beginning after June 15, 2016, except for the requirements of this Statement for the selection of assumptions in a circumstance in which an employer's pension liability is measured as of a date other than the employer's most recent fiscal year-end. The GASB has issued Statement No. 83, “*Certain Asset Retirement Obligations*.” The objective of this Statement is to provide financial statement users with information about asset retirement obligations (AROs) that were not addressed in GASB standards by establishing uniform accounting and financial reporting requirements for these obligations. This Statement establishes criteria for determining the timing and the pattern of recognition of a liability and a corresponding deferred outflow of resources for AROs, and requires (1) that recognition occur when the liability is both incurred and reasonably estimable; (2) the measurement of an ARO to be based on the best estimate of the current value of outlays expected to be incurred; (3) the current value of a government’s AROs to be adjusted for the effects of general inflation or deflation at least annually; (4) a government to evaluate all relevant factors at least annually to determine whether the effects of one or more of the factors are expected to significantly change the estimated asset retirement outlays; and (5) disclosure of information concerning the nature of a government’s AROs, the methods and assumptions used for the estimates of the liabilities, and the estimated remaining useful life of the associated tangible capital assets. The requirements of this Statement are effective for reporting periods beginning after June 15, 2018. The District plans to adopt this Statement as applicable by the effective date.

The GASB has issued Statement No. 84, “*Fiduciary Activities*.” The objective of this Statement is to improve guidance regarding the identification of fiduciary activities for accounting and financial reporting purposes and how those activities should be reported. This Statement establishes criteria for identifying fiduciary activities of all state and local governments. The focus of the criteria generally is on (1) whether a government is controlling the assets of the fiduciary activity and (2) the beneficiaries with whom a fiduciary relationship exists. Separate criteria are included to identify fiduciary component units and postemployment benefit arrangements that are fiduciary activities. The GASB has issued Statement No. 86, “*Certain Debt Extinguishment Issues*.” The primary objective of this Statement is to improve consistency in accounting and financial reporting for in-substance defeasance of debt by providing guidance for transactions in which cash and other monetary assets acquired with only existing resources—resources other than the proceeds of refunding debt—are placed in an irrevocable trust for the sole purpose of extinguishing debt. This Statement also improves accounting and financial reporting for prepaid insurance on debt that is extinguished and notes to financial statements for debt that is defeased in substance. The requirements of this Statement are effective for reporting periods beginning after June 15, 2017. The District plans to adopt this Statement as applicable by the effective date.

The GASB has issued Statement No. 87, “*Leases*.” The objective of this Statement is to better meet the information needs of financial statement users by improving accounting and financial reporting for leases by governments. This Statement increases the usefulness of governments' financial statements by requiring recognition of certain lease assets and liabilities for leases that previously were classified as operating leases and recognized as inflows of resources or outflows of resources based on the payment provisions of the contract. It establishes a single model for lease accounting based on the foundational principle that leases are financings of the right to use an underlying asset. Under this Statement, a lessee is required to recognize a lease liability and an intangible right-to-use lease asset, and a lessor is required to recognize a lease receivable and a deferred inflow of resources, thereby enhancing the relevance and consistency of information about governments' leasing activities. The requirements of this Statement are effective for reporting periods beginning after December 15, 2019. The District plans to adopt this Statement as applicable by the effective date.

(7) SUBSEQUENT EVENT

When the District sold the 2015 series of bonds, a portion of the proceeds were deposited in escrow to be released to the developer in November 2017 if it satisfied certain conditions (most of which dealt with the amount of leased space and the average sales per square foot of those tenants). The conditions for release of funds to the developer were not satisfied. As a result, \$1,210,000 (consisting of \$1,100,000 from the Escrow Fund and \$110,000 from the Reserve Fund) were transferred to the Extraordinary Redemption Fund and used to redeem a portion of the Series 2015 Bonds on November 1, 2017.

Internal Control over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the District's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control.

A *deficiency in internal control* exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A *material weakness* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A *significant deficiency* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.
